

INSPECTOR LAUDS LOCAL GUARD UNIT HOUSING PROGRAM

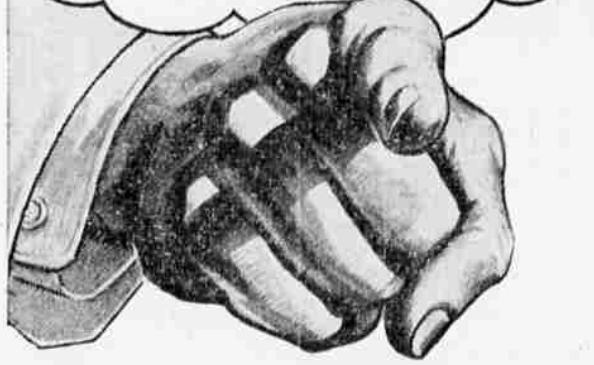
