NEW DRUG FREES EPILEPSY VICTIMS

Chicago, Dec. 13—(U.P.)—The Journal of the American Medical Association reported today that a new drug, tridione, was destined to remove the blighting effect of epilepsy.

The Journal published an article by Dr. William G. Lennox, Harvard Medical School, describing the drug as "the most dramatic in its effect of any form of therapy attempted" in the treatment of epilepsy. Dr. Lennox said that out of 40 patients he had treated with tridione, 11, or 28 per cent, were freed from epileptic seizures; 21, or 52 per cent, experienced a 75 per cent or greater reduction in the number of seizures; and one patient was helped moderately. He warned, however, that the effect of the new drug treatment still was being investigated. It is not yet on the market.

FIRST RADAR PERMIT GOES TO PUGET FERRY

Washington, Dec. 13—(U.P.)—The Federal Communications commission today granted its first approval for the civilian use of radar.

Radar equipment will be used experimentally on a ferry operating in Puget Sound, Wash. The agency authorized the Raytheon Manufacturing Co., New York, to install experimental radar equipment on the SS Kalakala, a passenger and automobile ferry operating between Bremerton and Seattle, Wash. The authorization was for 90 days.

MRS. MANSFELD AWAKE MEDICAL MAN'S OPINION

San Francisco, Dec. 13—(U.P.)—A medical opinion that Mrs. Annie Irene Mansfeld was "fully conscious" when she shot and killed Nurse Vada Martin for the alleged "love theft" of her husband was recorded today as the socialist's murder trial entered its 13th day. Testifying for the prosecution, Dr. Mervyn H. Hirschfeld, specialist in nervous disorders, said he found no reason to believe Mrs. Mansfeld was unconscious or in a state of "hysterical amnesia," when she shot Mrs. Martin last Oct. 4.

Philadelphia, Dec. 12—(U.P.)—Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt, 33-year-old millionaire sportsman, and his bride, Jeanne Lourdes Murray, 22, were honeymooning today. They were married yesterday by Magistrate Nathan A. Belfel in the Philadelphia city hall.

EMPLOYMENT BILL COMPROMISE HIT

Washington, Dec. 13—(U.P.)—The house's compromise full employment bill was denounced by both democrats and republicans today as debate opened on the measure.

Rep. William Whittington, D. Miss., however, defended it. He said it would help prevent unemployment, depressions and inflation. But Rep. John S. Gibson, D. Ga., called the measure a "political compromise" which resulted "in what the people in the south sometimes call a misconception." Whittington supported the bill drafted by the house executive expenditures committee by saying that a senate-approved version, endorsed by the administration, "followed a philosophy that would take us into state socialism."

SOUTH SEA ISLE ARTICLES TO BE IN HUGE MUSEUM

Lincoln, Neb.—(U.P.)—The University of Nebraska State Museum, famous for its collection of prehistoric fossils, has opened a different sort of display—150 rare items from the South Sea islands.

The shark-tooth spears, wooden hair combs, grass skirts and other curios were collected more than 40 years ago, Dr. C. B. Schultz, director, said. At the time L. W. Osborn, father of the donor, gathered the items, the islands were not yet influenced by white tourists and traders.

Returning South Pacific veterans may be familiar with the islands from which the collection came—Tarawa, Ellis, Samoa, the Gilberts, the Marshalls and the Philippines—but they probably will not have seen the curios, Schultz said. The Polynesian display includes grass mats of such intricate design that two years were spent in making them. Bark cloth pounded and rolled to paper thinness and dyed with native materials is another prize. Other unusual items are necklaces made of shells so tiny 80 can be put in a teaspoon; brilliantly colored grass skirts and fans; war clubs, and a heavy breast-plate, the native's idea of protection from spears and arrows.

MUKDEN ENTERED BY NATIONALISTS

Chungking, Dec. 13—(U.P.)—The newspaper Sin Min Pao said today Chinese nationalist ground troops have entered Mukden, foremost industrial city of Manchuria, and that the first planeload of airborne occupation troops landed at Changchun, the Manchurian capital.

A United Press dispatch from Peiping said Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek arrived there by plane to supervise the reorganization of Manchuria. Chiang will seek to occupy Manchuria with seven armies.
