HEARING ON MILK GRADES SET FOR CAPITOL DEC. 21

Salem — A public hearing to consider final suggestions in the matter of establishing state grades and standards for fluid milk and cream sold in the bottle and can trade has been called by the state department of agriculture for 10 a. m. Friday, Dec. 21. The hearing will be held in room 321 of the state capitol at Salem and is open to all interested parties. Dairyman, producer-distributors and distributors particularly are urged to attend. O. K. Beals, chief of the division of foods and dairies, will preside.

This hearing is held by authority of the 1945 law, chapter 369, which provides that after investigation the department shall establish official state grades and standards of quality for milk, both pasteurized and unpasteurized, under which grades fluid milk shall be labeled and sold. This law went through the last legislature as House Bill 371.

In the hearing on Dec. 21, the state grades and standards to be presented will call for grade A pasteurized and grade A unpasteurized milk. This, as the proposed standards are set up will be a premium grade of milk. Another grade designation will also be established but just what the final name of this grade will be will not be known definitely until all suggestions gathered at the hearing are sifted. There has been some suggestion that this be called Standard, with the two grades, pasteurized and unpasteurized, to be set up just as in the case of Grade A pasteurized and Grade A unpasteurized.

SHADY COVE STORE TO HAVE MODERN BUILDING

Shady Cove, Dec. 14—A modern frame structure now under construction here is scheduled to be completed and occupied early next spring by the Valley Supply Company, according to the proprietors, Roy Abbott and Ray Briggs.

Louis Mayer Tops Salary Earner Is Treasury's Report

Washington, Dec. 14 — (U.P.)—Louis B. Mayer, Hollywood film magnate, led the list of high U. S. salary earners for the 1943-44 fiscal year, a treasury report disclosed today.

The report showed that Mayer received \$908,070 from Loew's Inc.

The list included salaries, bonuses and other compensation, but excluded investment returns. Charles E. Wilson, president of General Motors Corp., placed second. He received \$459,041. Thomas J. Watson, president, International Business Machines, was third with salary and compensation of \$425,548.

Others on the first ten included: Bud Abbott and Lou Costello, Universal Pictures, \$424,319. Fred MacMurray, Paramount Pictures, \$419,166. Walter Wanger, Universal Pictures producer, \$409,928. John B. Hawley, Northern Ordinance Inc., Minneapolis, Minn., \$400,000. Nicholas M. Schenck, president, Loew's Inc., \$391,860. Ormond E. Hunt, executive vice-president, General Motors, \$359,519. Albert Bradley, executive vice-president, General Motors, \$350,432. Deanna Durbin, Universal Pictures singer and actress, placed eleventh on the list with \$326,491. She was the nation's highest-salaried woman for the year. Actress Barbara Stanwyck was the second highest-paid woman with \$323,333.

Cold Locker Plant At Shady Cove Has 438 Storage Cells

Shady Cove, Dec. 14—In operation here since November 26 has been the Shady Cove Frozen Locker Plant, managed by J. D. Favrow and R. G. Holcomb. The plant contains 438 lockers of which approximately one half are in use, Mr. Favrow says. A blower type freezing unit that does away with overhead pipes in the locker room is employed. In addition to the locker compartment the plant has rooms for chilling and for cutting meat.

Graft, Corruption Of Chiang Regime Disgusts Yankees

Tacoma, Wash., Dec. 14 — (U.P.)—Chiang Kai-Shek is no more democratic than Hitler, Lt. Col. W. J. Peterkin, who spent two years in central and communist China as a military observer for Gen. Joseph Stilwell, said today. "The nationalist government is graft-ridden beyond belief," the officer said. "In a single instance, one nationalist Chinese general received \$2,000,000 of the \$3,000,000 paid on a contract

for constructing troop barracks." "The Chungking graft, corruption and misuse of lend-lease materials is what most disgusts American G.I.s," Colonel Peterkin said. "It's common to see U. S. lend-lease items on sale in Chinese stores."

Forest Tragedy Found in Search For Yule Trees

Two Camp White civilian employees have reported the unusual experience of finding the remains of a deer which had been killed by a falling tree. The two men, Dee Mills, Jacksonville, and Roy Shull, Central Point, found the animal under a fallen tree while in the Applegate section cutting Christmas trees for the Camp White hospital according to the report made to Rogue River National Forest service employees.

The men made the trip up the Beaver Road and had taken a truck with a winch on the front in order to clear the road, obstructed by trees and other debris which fell during recent wind storms. Just beyond Beaver Sulphur camp they lifted a tree only to find the body of a last year's fawn directly under the tree trunk.
