

P. O. WILL CLOSE CHRISTMAS DAY

Medford's postoffice will be closed all day tomorrow with the exception of the general delivery window according to Frank DeSouza, postmaster, who stated that this window would be open from 9 a. m. until noon for delivery of packages to persons receiving notices. 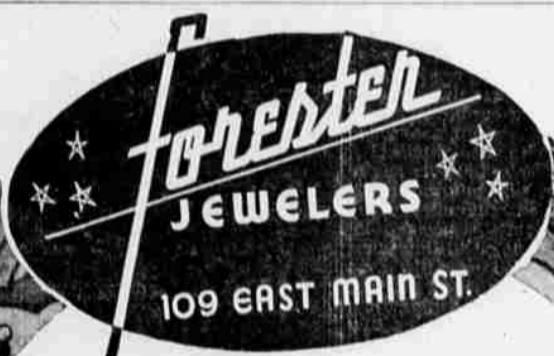
