Klamath Falls, Dec. 24—Beginning this week, the Herald and News, Klamath Falls daily paper, will be published in four and six pages, with practically no advertising, according to A. D. Addison, advertising manager.

Addison said the reason for the drastic move was that paper had been used up too fast and advertising would have to be cut to "only a trace" to provide enough paper to finish out the year.

Newsprint rationing ends Jan. 1 when paper companies will take over the problem of dividing newsprint among their customers, Addison declared.
