Houston, Tex., Dec. 28 (U.P.) — Impulsive Louis Boldreghini, liquor dealer who steps outside his store each Saturday to throw dimes away, today calmly supervised the destruction of the last of \$80,000 worth of rum, wines and brandies.

"That's junk," he said. "I'm tired of shoving that stuff down the customers' throats."
There was no catch to the destruction, he said, and state liquor control officers agreed. He will get no refund on liquor taxes nor will he be able to write it off as a loss on his income tax.

British Round Up Jewish Terrorists
Jerusalem, Dec. 28 (U.P.) — Units of the British 6th airborne division blockaded the streets of Jerusalem and Tel Aviv today and began arresting hundreds of suspected Jewish terrorists after a night of gunfire and bombings in four Palestine cities that caused at least 10 deaths.
Authorities hinted strongly that many of the arrested men would be deported from the holy land if investigation confirmed the general belief that the night's violence was the work of secret Jewish "armies."

Distressed Ship Has Bomb Cargo
New York, Dec. 28 (U.P.) — The liberty ship Henry D. Thoreau was "in distress" today off the Azores, with a cargo of bombs, apparently loosened by storms, threatening to smash through her hull, a signal intercepted here by naval air-sea rescue command said.
The distress signal, picked up at 5 a. m., said that if the bombs gave way completely, "nothing can save us."

Reno, Nev., Dec. 28 (U.P.) — Mrs. Francis Heenan Browning Hynes Civelli, known to New York's cafe society, as "Peaches" Browning, maintained residence in a swank hotel today after announcing she planned a "friendly" divorce from San Francisco department store executive Joseph C. Civelli.

MEXICANS LEAVE
New Haven, Conn., Dec. 28 (U.P.) — More than 200 Mexican laborers who came to the United States to ease the war labor shortage left here today by special train to Mexico.

RAT CONTROL MOBILE
New Orleans (U.P.) — The city health department has forgotten about the Pied Piper of Hamelin, and is using scientific methods instead.
Seeking to rid the city of rats and wipe out typhus, the city has organized a three-man rat-control crew with a mobile workshop and equipment. The crew, depending a great deal on DDT, is cleaning out all spots suspected of being breeding grounds for rats.
