

INCOME OF VALLEY DAIRY \$2,500,000; BEEF \$1,500,000

A late, bad growing spring, with almost continuous rains throughout May, was off set by a late fall and a warm harvest time, the county agent said. A critical labor shortage prevailed throughout the 1945 season, it was further stated.

The gross income of the dairy industry for 1945 in Jackson county is estimated at \$2,500,000, approximately the same as last year by County Agent Robert G. Fowler. The gross income from beef cattle is fixed at \$1,500,000.

Grains and hay brought a gross income of \$900,000, seeds \$384,000, and turkey from Jackson county \$550,000, with \$450,000 for Josephine county estimated by Fowler. Most of the Josephine county fowls were shipped from local plants.

The total gross income of agricultural and horticultural products from Jackson county was previously estimated by the county agent at \$20,000,000, a 25 per cent increase over last year.

ALL SHOE REPAIR PRICE SAME JAN. 1

All shoe repair shops in the out-state Oregon district will be required to post dollar and cent prices for repair services, effective Tuesday, January 1, 1946, Robert Lowe, OPA price specialist, stated today.

The prices in each shop will be the same. These prices are the result of a survey of the industry and meetings with trade committees.

Since 1942 shoe repair prices have been based on the individual seller's price as of March 1942. On January 1, 1946, this pricing method will be discontinued and the same price structure will be effective for all shops.

J. OSCAR FRAZIER
Services for J. Oscar Frazier, 79, who passed away Thursday, will be held in the Conger-Morris Chapel at 1:30 p. m. next Thursday, with the Reverend C. W. Frost officiating. Mr. Frazier was an active member in the Apostolic Faith Church for over thirty years.

JERUSALEM DARK AFTER TERRORISM, CURFEW INVOKED

Jerusalem, Dec. 29—(U.P.)—Jerusalem was in darkness tonight as a result of Thursday night's bombings and terrorist raids during which the Jaffa Road electric power station was wrecked.

Troops patrolled the streets in a pouring rain tonight, their footfalls virtually the only sounds in the deserted street. At 4 p. m. the curfew went back into effect, and the crowds of shoppers and Sabbath worshippers, which had thronged the streets during the day, disappeared.

On Jaffa Road, work crews still labored under lights power-clear the wreckage of the shell-blasted wing of police headquarters.

The 10 soldiers and police officers who were killed in Thursday night's fighting were buried yesterday and today.

Authoritative sources said land mines, Sten guns, grenades and ammunition were uncovered in police searches of areas in Jerusalem and Tel Aviv near the scene of the bomb explosions. The searches here covered the buildings near the so-called Russian compound where an entire section of a police headquarters was knocked down by a bomb.

SCHOOL HOLIDAY ENDS WEDNESDAY; JR. HIGH CROWDED

Medford schools will open Jan. 2 following a week's holiday, E. H. Hedrick, city school superintendent, announced yesterday.

Alex McDonald, former social studies teacher and assistant in athletics is to return to the high school the second semester, Hedrick said. McDonald served on the school staff before his induction into the navy in early 1942. His wife and baby are remaining at their home in Banks, Ore., for the present.

"All other teachers will remain practically the same," he said, "with the exception of the principalship of Washington school, to which Kenneth Hulbert has been assigned." Hulbert, who formerly served as instructor and coach at Central Point, is replacing Frank R. Honts, who resigned in November to enter business.

All city schools are very crowded and there is a bad seating problem due to the inability to buy seats, according to the superintendent. "Congestion is very bad at junior high school," Hedrick said. The school was built for a maximum student body of 500 and now houses 725 pupils, it was stated.

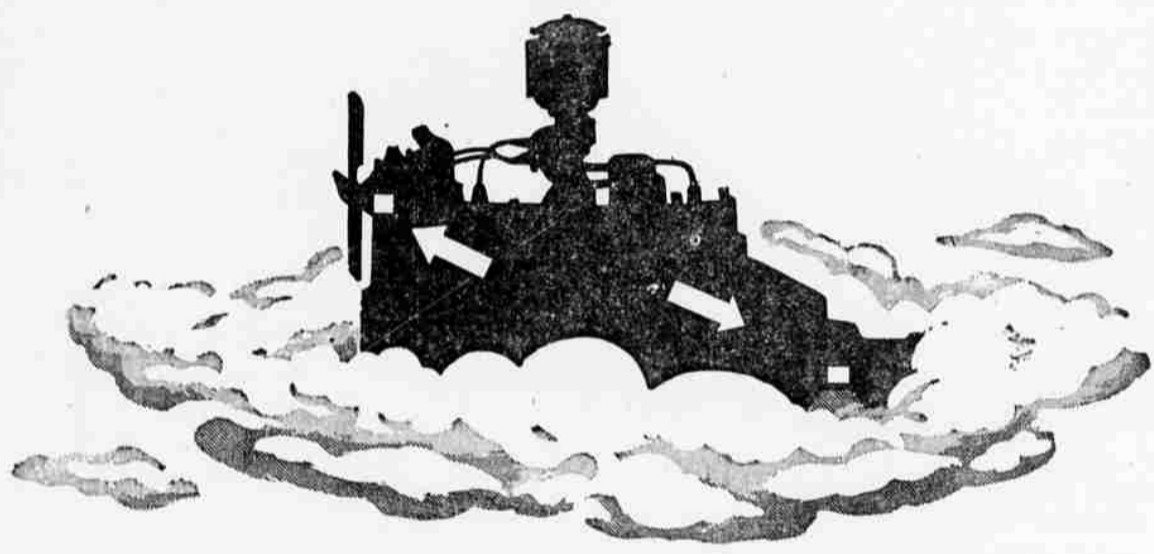

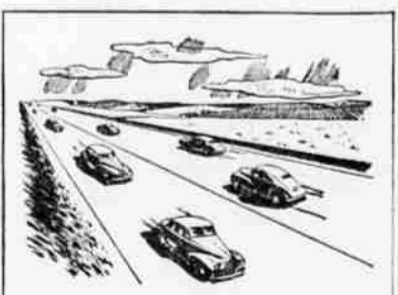
