

## ATTENDANCE UP AS SCHOOLS OPEN AFTER HOLIDAYS

Attendance at Medford city schools yesterday was considerably better than in the closing days before the Christmas holidays. It was reported from the office of the school superintendent, E. H. Hedrick, that the last day before closing in some instances ran nearly one-fourth of the school enrollments due to influenza and other illnesses.

Only senior high school attendance had dropped. Yesterday senior high school reported 104 absent pupils, not including members of the football squad not yet back from San Francisco where they attended the annual East-West game, as compared to 99 the last day before vacation. Junior high school had 79 pupils as compared to 160 the last day before vacation.

Jackson school had but 49 absent pupils yesterday, compared to 160 the closing day, while Lincoln school absences totaled 57, same as the last day before vacation. Roosevelt also had 57 absences, as compared to 70 before vacation, while Washington reported 63, compared to 140.

Absences in all schools totaled 409 yesterday as against 696 the final day before vacation.

## New City Editor Takes Duties At Ashland Tidings

Ashland, Jan. 3—Announcement of the appointment of Doyle D. Seely, Portland, as city editor of the Daily Tidings was made today by G. M. Green, editor-manager.

Prior to the war Seely was associated with the Enterprise at Oregon City. 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## AERIAL FREIGHT TO START FEB. 1

New York, Jan. 3—(U.P.)—United Air Lines will enter the air freight field Feb. 1 with the lowest charges ever proposed by an airline, the company announced today.

United will fly freight to the Pacific coast for about a third

of the cost of present-day air express, according to Charles P. Graddick, director of air cargo. Typical of the tariffs filed with the civil aeronautics board is one of 27 cents a pound on shipments of 3,000 pounds and over from New York to the Pacific coast.

Charges are graduated according to volume and distance, giving the lowest possible rates to volume shippers for long hauls, Graddick said.

Air freight from New York to the Pacific coast will cost \$33.63 for 100-pound shipments, and

\$26.90 per 100 pounds for shipments of 3000 pounds or more, compared with \$73.68 for 100 pounds by air express.

**REASSIGN POWER SAWS**  
DENISON, Tex. (U.P.)—Saws manufactured here during the war for use in clearing southwest Pacific jungles, now are going to South American countries. Most of a backlog of 1,500 orders at a power saw company are scheduled for the governments of Chile, Colombia, Panama and Mexico.

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## SEVERAL MILLS RESUME IN PINE

Portland, Ore., Jan. 3—(U.P.)—Several pine mills in the Klamath basin area resumed operation today following ratification of a 15-cent-an-hour pay boost by some locals in opposition to the northwest strike policy committee's stand against the agreement.

Base pay of the workers was raised from 87½ cents to \$1.02½. The AFL strike policy committee objected, saying the agreement provided that wage issues between the men and operators be closed for a year unless the OPA grants a raise in lumber prices in excess of the

cost of pay increases. Meanwhile, the committee continued its meeting in Snoke, Wash., with the announced intention of obtaining a uniform \$1.05 an hour in the pine belt, thus equalizing fir and pine base pays.
