

SURGEON SOUGHT AS ABORTIONIST; FLEES EVE RAID

San Francisco, Jan. 5—(U.P.)—As the search continued today for Dr. C. B. Caldwell, alleged operator of a downtown "abortion clinic," the district attorney's office reported unearthing evidence which may link the prominent northern California surgeon with a second death

due to alleged abortions. A joint police-district attorney's office squad yesterday raided the exclusive Market street offices of Caldwell, armed with a second-degree murder warrant naming him in connection with the death Christmas day of Mrs. Signa Bredesen, San Francisco housewife. They found the offices empty of patients, nurses and the doctor. Special Agent Joseph Williams of the state medical board told the district attorney's office that Mrs. Viola Maltagliati, Woodland, Calif., who died about a year ago, gave a statement to investigators prior to her death in which she said she submitted to an operation performed by Caldwell. Williams did not say whether the operation was an abortion. Police here said that the investigation of Caldwell had been in progress since Mrs. Bredesen died after a suspected visit to Caldwell's elaborately equipped establishment. Yesterday's raid was a part of a city-wide crackdown on establishments where illegal abortions allegedly are performed. Police said they were contemplating raids against five other "abortion mills" as soon as "we have enough evidence."

MORGAN'S OUSTER HELD TOO HASTY
London, Jan. 5—(U.P.)—Lt. Gen. Sir Frederick E. Morgan, ousted operations chief of the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration in Germany, has been summoned here to submit his resignation formally, a UNRRA official said today. Up to noon Frankfurt time today (6 a. m. EST), UNRRA officials in the German city said Morgan had not received notification of his dismissal. A UNRRA spokesman announced here late today however, that a cable summoning Morgan had been sent this morning and that he has received it. Some British newspapers suggested editorially that the UNRRA had acted too hastily in ousting Morgan without further hearing.

San Diego, Jan. 5—(U.P.)—The assault transport Mifflin arrived here today with 1687 marines and navy veterans.

STRIKE, WEATHER SUICIDE CAUSES

San Francisco, Jan. 5—(U.P.)—Two bay area men shot themselves to death today because they were forced out of work by strikes and rainy weather and a third committed suicide because he had been ill, police reported today.

Mrs. Ruthie van Buskirk told officers her husband, Roy, 50, killed himself because he was dejected since he was out of a job at the Bethlehem shipyards as a result of the machinist's strike.

Shirley Neil, 34, Oakland lumberyard worker, placed a .22 caliber rifle muzzle in his mouth and pulled the trigger, Police reported. His wife told police that heavy rains had kept her husband from working and he had begun drinking heavily.

RAPID RELEASES FROM ARMY HURT

Tokyo, Jan. 5—(U.P.)—Secretary of War Robert P. Patterson said today that a "critical" situation exists in some United States army overseas territories because of over rapid releases of men from service.

Patterson said that the war department was preparing a release stating overseas garrison requirements that "may govern the rate of discharge for the next few months." He said the discharge requirements gradually will be changed to reach a minimum overseas requirement of 795,000 men by July 1.

ALUM TRUST HITS AGENCY CHARGES

Washington, Jan. 5—(U.P.)—The surplus property administration charged tonight that the giant aluminum company of America is using its patent license rights to block disposal of government-owned wartime aluminum plants to Alcoa competitors.

Alcoa promptly denied the charge as "absolutely without foundation" and said conferences now under way with government agencies gave hope of agreement within a few days on a solution to the licensing problem.

NEW CITY LISTED AS UNO CAPITAL

New York, Jan. 5—(U.P.)—A seven-man delegation from the United Nations organizations arrived here by plane from London today and added a new name to the list of possible sites for the permanent home of UNO—Providence, R. I. The city's name came up when the committee listed five places where they expected to spend "several days"—New York, Boston, Hyde Park, Princeton, N. J., and Providence.

PLEASANT TIME, IKE
San Francisco, Jan. 5—(U.P.)—Cmdr. Ike Hashimoto, skipper of the Japanese submarine that sank the heavy cruiser U. S. S. Indianapolis, boarded the navy transport Effingham today to return to Japan after testifying at the court martial trial of Capt. Charles B. McVay III, captain of the Indianapolis.


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
