

# Pappy's Ardent Telegrams Revealed By Jilted Beauty

Reno, Nev., Jan. 9—(U.P.)—Mrs. Lucy Malcolmson, 34, brunette New York socialite who was jilted by Marine Ace Lt. Col. Gregory (Pappy) Boyington, today publicly disclosed the contents of telegrams in which Boyington declared his ardent love for her.

Mrs. Malcolmson, at the same time halted divorce proceedings against her wealthy husband because Boyington, in southern California, denied her announcement that they would be married.

**Don't Want Pappy**  
"I wouldn't take Pappy back now if he was gold plated," Mrs. Malcolmson said.

Through her attorney, Joseph Haller, Mrs. Malcolmson released the following telegrams which she said were sent by Boyington during a trans-continental tour.

Nov. 8: "I love you. Hurry up and get out here. Miss you terribly. All my love, Pappy."

Nov. 11: "After arriving Omaha distance will go faster. Practically nuts now as you and time are close. Love you, darling."

Nov. 10: "Doing fine, baby. Darling, keep it up. Don't worry about your time under the wire. I love you so darn much."

Nov. 8: "Nice work darling. Counting the days. Good luck. I love you."

**Signed Appleduck**  
One telegram released by Haller was signed "Your Appleduck."

Mrs. Malcolmson said she planned to stay in Reno now.

"I like it here. I haven't anything to be ashamed of. But I wish Pappy would get in touch with me. I intend to seek employment here."

Asked what kind of work she would do, she said:

"I'm darned if I know."

Boyington, a congressional medal of honor winner, told the United Press in San Diego that "there never were any marriage plans as far as I know. The lady made a mistake—we're friends, but not that friendly."

"I can't believe it," Mrs. Malcolmson said when told of Boyington's denials. "I talked to him Saturday and everything was all set."

Today she admitted that her first confusion and tears had given way to "some anger."

# TOO MUCH PAINT FOUND BAD FOR WOODEN HOUSES

Washington (U.P.)—It's as bad to paint your buildings too much as too little, according to the National Bureau of Standards.

A Bureau circular points out that while too thin an application provides only short-term protection, too thick a coating will crack eventually because of its inability to withstand expansion and contraction.

The total thickness of the properly painted outside surface should be between two-to-five-thousandths of an inch, the circular states. A good way to keep a house or barn fully protected is to wash it every second year and repaint it about every fourth year. A surface should be recoated when cracks which reach to the wood appear in the old paint. This falling usually occurs on the side of the building most directly exposed to the sunlight.

The circular says that although a minimum of three coats of paint were formerly believed necessary for an adequate initial painting, special primers for wood and two-coat paint systems which give good durability have been developed in recent years. It warns, however, that as much paint should be applied in two coats as is normally spread on in the older method.

Generally speaking, greater resistance to the weather also will be obtained if dark-colored or tinted paints are used rather than white or other light hues.

# COMMITTEE EYES RACIAL PHASES IN HAWAII HEARINGS

By Willard D. Eberhart United Press Correspondent Honolulu, T. H., Jan. 9—(U.P.)

The question of Hawaii's polyglot population today appeared to be uppermost in the minds of members of a house subcommittee conducting a hearing on the territory's request for statehood.

As the hearings moved into the second day, Rep. Homer D. Angell, R., Ore., said "The subject of racial backgrounds and current practices is the most important topic in this fact-finding investigation."

Other committeemen echoed Angell's statement, pointing out that the territory's population includes Chinese, Polynesians, Japanese, Filipino and a variety of other strains. Some expressed the fear that persons of Japanese ancestry could move in and dominate public offices if statehood were granted.

Angell said that outside the hearing, people on the mainland are not familiar with local conditions and added that it is up to the subcommittee to develop all phases of the question for the information of the full committee.

Yesterday, Gov. Ingram Stainback presented the territory's official case for statehood before the subcommittee, declaring that "the people of Hawaii feel their period of pupillage has been completed and fair consideration of their case can culminate in but one answer—statehood."

**Tap On Cop's Head Brings \$500 Fine**

Ontario, Ore., Jan. 9—(U.P.)—The tap on the head that Charles W. Murphy of Huntington, Ore., gave to Oregon State Patrolman H. C. Snider cost him \$500.

Murphy was fined \$500 in the circuit court of Judge M. A. Biggs yesterday when he admitted he hit Snider over the head with a flashlight while the latter was driving him to state police headquarters in Ontario.

# Nez Perce Indians Protest Plans For Law Modernization

Lewiston, Ida., Jan. 9—(U.P.)—The Nez Perce Indian tribe, some 1500 strong, were on record today opposing the modernization of its tribal laws in what was considered a slap at the Department of the Interior, which governs America's vanishing race.

North Idaho Indian Superintendent Archie Phinney said final tabulation of a special election held among tribesmen resulted in an overwhelming and unexpected 176 to 109 defeat for a new constitution and might result in the government's withdrawal of the Indian agency on the reservation.
