New York, Jan. 14—(U.P.)—Steel issues led the stock market higher today when a postponement of the steel strike indicated this outlook may be averted. Gains in the steel group lifted the industrial average more than two points to a new high since Oct. 7, 1930. The railroad average rose more than a point to a new top since Sept. 1, 1931, while the utility component hit a composite average of 65 stocks reached a new high since the compilation was started 15 years ago. Preliminary closing Dow-Jones stock averages: Industrials 201.89, up 2.45; utilities 66.14, up 1.26; railroads 40.29, up 0.46; 65 stocks 75.68; up 1.05. Sales totaled 2,740,000 shares compared with 2,260,000 Friday.
