

KIWANIANS TOLD SAFETY FACTOR NEEDS EMPHASIS

From 87 to 90 per cent of accidents can be prevented by safety consciousness through training according to Clarence H. Schwartz, Red Cross first aid, water safety and accident prevention field representative for Oregon who addressed Kiwanians at their luncheon meeting in the Holland hotel blue room Wednesday noon.

Accidents have increased since 1900 to a point where they are a leading cause of fatalities in the country. Yearly average of deaths by accident is 95,000. More casualties were totaled at home during the war years than in the services. Home casualties amounted to 36,355,000 and military to 1,070,524. There were 255,000 deaths on the home front and 1,250,000 permanent disabilities. Service force casualty figure represents all categories including missing in action and taken prisoner.

An average of 32,000 deaths per year come from accidents at home, Schwartz pointed out, at a cost per capita of \$20 excluding hospital bills. Over one-fourth of these accidents occur in the kitchen.

The Red Cross is sponsoring courses in order that safety training may reach into the homes according to Schwartz who has been conducting evening classes in Ashland and at the courthouse here. He stated that safety must be an integral part of life and that more interest was necessary.

Kiwanians will hold installation of officers next Tuesday evening preceded by a dinner at 6:30 in the Holland Hotel Blue room for members and their wives.

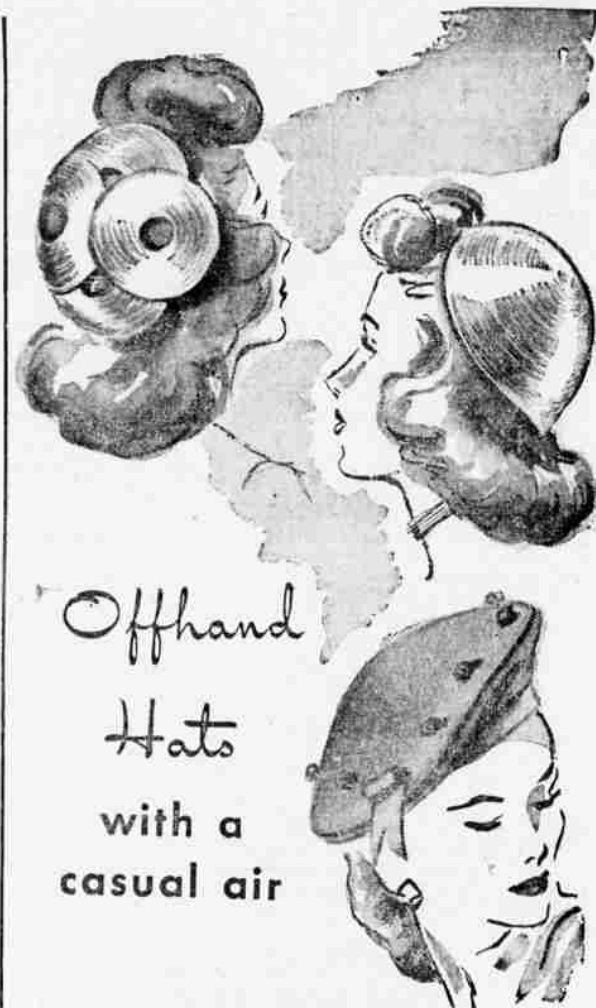
