

VETS ADVISED TO KEEP INSURANCE POLICIES PAID UP

Salem—Veterans should remember to keep their national service life insurance policies paid up after discharge from the service, Hugh E. Rosson, director of the State Department of Veterans' Affairs, advised this week. The fact that a man is discharged from the armed forces does not terminate this insurance, provided he continues the premium payments, Mr. Rosson explained.

If the veteran has allowed his insurance to lapse, however, he may have it reinstated, either within six months after date of discharge or within three months after date of lapse, whichever is later, by payment of only two monthly premiums without interest and by filing a statement showing that he is in good health as he was on the date of lapse.

Facts To Remember

After expiration of the two periods stated above, the veteran must be in good health and furnish satisfactory evidence thereof in the form of a complete physical examination. This examination may be obtained free through the Veterans' Administration. Other facts to remember:

1. First premium payment after discharge is usually payable during the first month of discharge.
2. Always show policy number when making payment.
3. If number is not known, payment should be accompanied by a letter giving name, serial number, rank, organization, and date of birth.
4. At any time after the policy is in force for one year, but before the expiration of eight years, it should be converted into ordinary life, 20-payment life, or 30-payment life policies.
5. Checks, drafts, or money orders for premium payments should be made payable to the treasurer of the United States and sent to: Collections Subdivision, Veterans' Administration, Washington, 25, D. C.

COAST GUARD HAS EDUCATION PLAN

Roger Herendeen, chief signalman of the United States Coast Guard, in Medford this week to establish a temporary recruiting office, stated that young men enlisting for a period of military service need not give up hope of training for a post-war career.

The Coast Guard places strong emphasis, he said, upon the training of its personnel for the many specialized post-war and peacetime duties performed by the service.

In addition to basic training at Alameda, California, and the travel incident to every assignment, Coast Guardsmen have the opportunity to attend special training schools if they qualify by aptitude and interest.

Correspondence courses, with credits applicable to high school and college diplomas, are available through the Coast Guard Institute and the Armed Forces Institute.

To those who enlist before October 6, 1946, all the benefits of the G. I. Bill of Rights will be available, including three or more years of education in any accredited school for which he might qualify.

Herendeen will be available for interviews each Monday during the remainder of January and the month of February at Room 22 in the post office.
