Al Simpson predicted a couple of basketball victories for his Medford high school team this weekend after sending the squad through its fourth night of tough practice in preparation for their Southern Oregon conference clash at Ashland tonight and their inter-sectional mix with University

of Oregon Frosh here tomorrow night.

Ashland, yet to win a conference tilt, dropped a 36-30 game to Klamath Falls and bowed to Grants Pass 44 to 34. The Grizzlies are pointing to a victory, according to word, drifting here from Ashland, and Coach Frank O'Neil has the Ashlanders polished to a fine point for the traditionally bitter game, first of a four-game series.

Comparative scores never seem to figure into an Ashland Medford athletic contest for the good natured rivalry is so great that often in the past the underdog has upset the favorite.

The Frosh, coached by Honest John Warren of Astoria high fame, will arrive here Saturday morning for their clash with the Tornado.

DDT GOOD TONIC FOR CHERRY FLY

Portland, Ore., Jan. 25—(U.P.)—What's sauce for the goose isn't always sauce for the gander. Or what DDT, the war developed insecticide kills one time it may cause to thrive and lead a happy and prolific life in another instance.

This fact of the powerful insecticide working in reverse was brought out here today as state and federal entomologists from five northern states considered suggestions for the 1946 tree fruit spray program. When entomologists began comparing research notes they found that not only does DDT fail to kill the cherry fruit fly, but it actually serves as a tonic to the pest. One worker reported that there were more cherry fruit fly maggots in cherries sprayed with a DDT mixture than on cherries in the unsprayed control plots.
