

VETERANS NEEDING HOUSING ASKED TO WRITE J. C. C. OF C.

Veterans of World War II in need of housing, if they or their wives have been former residents of the community, are requested to write the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce stating their problems in order that concrete evidence of the community's housing need may be presented to government officials convening here February 7.

Chamber of Commerce Man-

ager Frank Hull asks that calls not be made in person or by telephone since the information must appear in writing to serve as adequate evidence.

Hull emphasized that the chamber has no listings or houses but that the data is necessary to portray the need if additional housing units are to be secured. He said that a committee consisting of Eugene Thorndike, Mark Goldy, Joe Early and Herb Grey has been very active in trying to solve the problem during the past three years and that the committee has been in constant contact with governmental agencies, the army and the navy seeking allocations of surplus housing materials. They have faced the federal assertion that the area did not require housing projects other than the 125-unit one on Jackson street. New
