MEDFORD DOWNS ASHLAND QUINTET BY 43-32 COUNT

Tornado Continues To Head Conference By Taking Fast, Rough League Win

Medford high hoopers advanced a notch in the Southern Oregon conference race when they took a thrilling 43 to 32 victory from Ashland at the Grizzlies' home grounds Friday night. Despite the 11 point margin, it was an exciting battle with the large crowd making so much noise it sometimes was impossible for the players to hear the referees' whistles.

It was one of the fastest and roughest games of the season for the Black Tornado, who committed 13 fouls while 23 were called on Ashland. Medford connected with 13 out of 27 free throw attempts while Ashland sank 10 out of 18. Cal Hovland and Jim Jandreau of Ashland left the game on five fouls.

Riggs Scores First
Darrell Riggs scored from under the basket to ring up the first tally and the Tornado moved it to 4-0 before Domie Provost could connect for Ashland. Hovland hit one from the side to bring it 4-4 when the Tornado turned on the heat, moving into an 18-6 lead at end of the first period.

Ashland slipped in only three baskets and a free throw in the third quarter to move their score up to 13 while Medford clicked for 12 markers to make the score 25 to 13 for Medford when the teams left the floor at halftime.

Third Stanza Even
The teams played almost even in the third stanza when the Grizzlies ran up nine points to 10 for Medford. The red and white put on a brief scoring barrage early in the final period to bring the score to 38-30 for the Tornado until LeRoy House and Don Waldron put a stop to it with a total of five points between them. Jim Merriman hit for the Grizzlies seconds before the game ended to bring the score 43-32.

They tangle in a return clash here Tuesday night which will be a non-conference go.

Doug Coghill, center for the Medford high junior varsity, turned in the best performance of anyone on the floor last night as his team ran up a 43 to 21 triumph over the Ashland junior varsity in the preliminary. Coghill showed a lot of promise of capably filling the shoes of Riggs next season as he completely dominated both backboards and led his mates in the scoring department.
