Stockman Warns Against Dangers In British Loan

Washington, Jan. 26—(U.P.)—Rep. Lowell Stockman, R., Ore., today asked the house where the United States "would draw the line" if the proposed loan to Great Britain were granted.

"Let the British get their foot inside the door of the U. S. treasury and we'll have plenty of other 'customers' right behind them all expecting hand-outs," he told the house.

He listed Russia, France, Italy, Belgium and Poland as potential borrowers.

"It is perfectly obvious that we just cannot make all these loans without going bankrupt ourselves," he said.

SILENT SCREEN STAR IS FREED FROM HUBBY

New York, Jan. 26—(U.P.)—Gloria Swanson, star of the silent screen, was awarded a legal separation today from William M. Davey, with whom she lived for two months after their marriage on Jan. 29, 1945.

Supreme Court Justice Morris Eder, who awarded the separation, also dismissed a counterclaim for annulment brought by Davey and ruled that Miss Swanson could keep two star ruby rings which he had given her.
