

LOCAL HOSPITALS ARE APPROVED BY SURGEON COLLEGE

Both Community and Sacred Heart hospitals have been named on the 1946 list of approved hospitals by the American College of Surgeons according to an official announcement from the Surgeons' headquarters in Chicago. Dr. Irvin Abell of Louisville, Ky., chairman of the board of regents, stated that results of the 28th annual Hospital Standardization survey shows 3,181 hospitals, or 80.3 of those under survey, met the minimum standards of approval.

Dr. Abell praised hospital personnel, including thousands of volunteer workers, for their devotion to duty during the war and postwar emergency.

Requirements which the American College of Surgeons considers fundamental to good hospital care include a modern physical plant, clearly defined organization and duties; carefully selected governing board; a competent, well trained superintendent; adequate and efficient medical staff of ethical, competent physicians and surgeons; adequate diagnostic and therapeutic facilities; accurate, complete medical records; regular group conferences of the administrative and medical staff and a humanitarian spirit, the primary consideration being the best care of the patient, the announcement states.

Brides and Vets Get Main Supply Of Scarce Sheets

New York, Jan. 30—(U.P.)—If you're a bride or a veteran or a gold-plate dowager—maybe you can buy some sheets.

If you're not any of these, you'll just have to take your chances at finding some unadorned muslins or percales in the dark corner of a store—and when you find them, you'll probably be allowed to buy just two.

"We thought we might have at least half a normal supply this month," store managers wail, "but here it is the end of January, and we haven't had any shipments all month."

Manufacturers don't hold much hope for them either.

J. E. Bradley of Pacific Mills says the supply will be "slightly better" in 1946 than it was last year.

BAD BOOKKEEPING BLAMED IN LOSS OF NAVY MATERIAL

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 30—(U.P.) Sen. Hugh B. Mitchell, D., Wash., said today \$7,000,000 worth of government surplus property could not be located at the Navy Material Redistribution center in South Tacoma, but he blamed the discrepancy on poor bookkeeping.

Mitchell, on a tour of this area with other members of the Mead investigating committee, said the bulk of the alleged shortage consisted of plumbing and heating equipment and that local records did not conform with those compiled by the Navy department in Washington, D. C.

Mitchell said navy records showed \$30,000,000 worth of property at NMRC, but that an item-by-item check at the depot found only \$23,000,000 worth of goods on hand.

Commies Foment Singapore Strike

Singapore, Jan. 30—(U.P.)—A general strike paralyzed Singapore today as part of a communist and labor union demonstration against the British. Hospital, transportation and municipal workers were among the strikers.

The general strike was ordered yesterday at a meeting of more than 300 representatives of 105 labor organizations at communist headquarters to protest the arrest of a communist leader and other grievances against the British.

NYLON STOCKING DEAL PUZZLER FOR POLICE

Elko, Nev., Jan. 30—(U.P.)—Puzzled policemen here were wondering today where Jules Rubin, 40-year-old discharged merchant seaman, obtained 49 dozen pair of nylon stockings.

Rubin was free on \$1,500 bail today after his arrest early yesterday morning for violating OPA ceiling prices by selling the scarce stockings for \$6 a pair.

Washington, Jan. 30—(U.P.)—The House today passed and sent to the senate legislation to return operation of the United States employment service to the states not later than June 30, 1946.

RECREATION AREAS

Salem, Jan. 30—(U.P.)—Two areas in Marion county will be set aside as recreation areas, the county court reports. One will be a 100-acre tract in the Gates district along the North Santiam river, and the other will be 50 acres along the Santiam in the Niagara dam site district. The areas have been reserved for recreation on petition of the Isaac Walton league of Salem. The land is tax-delinquent.

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ANNUAL CONTEST ON AMERICANISM IN CITY SCHOOLS

The annual Americanism essay contest of the American Legion auxiliary is now underway in both Medford senior and junior high school. Title of the essay is to be "American Citizens, Our Responsibilities, Our Privileges."

Winning essay from each city is to be at state headquarters by March 1, making it necessary to close the local contest Feb. 12, Lincoln's birthday. Local prizes will be awarded on Feb. 22, Washington's birthday. Winning state essay will be entered in the national contest.

Prize for the state winner will be an 18-volume encyclopedia contributed by the Quarric corporation and the national award will be \$100. All juniors and senior high school students are eligible to compete and essays are to be no more than 500 words in length.

The local committee urges young people to discuss the project with their English teachers and to enter at once.

Norblad Seated As House Member

Washington, Jan. 30—(U.P.)—Walter A. Norblad, R., Ore., took his seat today as a member of the house. He was sworn in by Speaker Sam Rayburn.

Norblad was elected to the vacancy caused by the death of Rep. James W. Mott.

This gave the republicans 191 seats in the house to the democrats 236. Minor parties have two seats. There are still six vacancies.
