

BARTLETT PEAR MAXIMUM PRICES SET FOR CANNING

Portland, Jan. 31.—Processors' maximum prices for the 1945 pack of Bartlett pears, (peeled halves) produced in Oregon and Washington have been established at approximately the same level as last year's ceilings, the OPA food price section announced today, effective January 24.

This action will not materially affect retail prices.

These pears will be packed in light syrup and processors will use the same syrup differentials as those previously provided for California processors. The ceilings for canned Bartlett pears were based on the same raw material price as last year, \$73 a ton. Processors will continue to figure their maximum prices under pricing method No. 1, OPA said.

Higher prices, resulting from the correction of an error in last year's ceiling are established for pie and solid pack pie Bartlett pears, peeled halves, produced in Oregon and Washington (area 2).

This price increase is, for example, per dozen No. 10 cans \$1.72 for pie grade and \$1.47 for solid pack pie grade.

EUROPEANS SEEK HUGE U. S. LOANS

Paris, Jan. 31.—(U.P.)—Several European countries, including Russia, are negotiating in Washington for loans to permit them to buy surplus equipment left in Europe by the American army and navy, it was disclosed today.

Officials of the foreign liquidation commission charged with disposing of the military surplus told a touring U. S. senate sub-committee that Russia has asked for a \$100,000,000 loan to finance purchases of this equipment.

In addition they said, loans of \$40,000,000 each are being negotiated by Poland and Czechoslovakia and \$10,000,000 by Finland, while \$45,000,000 worth of surplus already have been allotted to Belgium under reverse lend-lease.

The witnesses also disclosed that arrangements are being made for the Netherlands to buy up to \$10,000,000 worth of surplus American goods, paying in guilders.
