

YOUNG PEOPLE OF PRESBYTERIAN TO ENTERTAIN LEADER

Miss Virginia Long, one of four young people sent across the nation on traveling fellowships by the board of Christian education of the Presbyterian Church, will visit and counsel with young people of the Presbyterian Church here Friday.

Miss Long graduated in 1945 from Biblical Seminary in New York. Her undergraduate degree is from the University of Illinois, with previous study also at Greenville College. Besides being active in debate, dramatics, literary groups and YWCA in college and university, Miss Long was an outstanding leader in youth work in her home church in Greenville, Ill.

Miss Long travels this year mainly in the Pacific Northwest, the Inter-Mountain area and Nebraska, speaking to churches, school assemblies, rallies, high school assemblies, and interviewing scores of high school and college students.

The young people of the Presbyterian church realizing the great privilege of having such a visitor have arranged a schedule whereby young people may have personal interviews with Miss Long on Friday. Appointments are made by calling the church office. A covered dish supper to be served at 6:30 is also planned. VETERANS FACING UNEMPLOYMENT

Washington, Jan. 31.—(U.P.)—The veterans of foreign wars predicted today that within a year millions of veterans will be selling apples unless congress grants them seniority rights on new employment.

V.F.W. Commander-in-Chief Joseph M. Stack urged passage of a bill by Rep. Harold Knutson, R., Minn., requiring that veterans applying for new jobs be credited with seniority for time spent in service.

The American Legion meanwhile drafted telegrams to industrial and labor leaders urging that a veterans' seniority clause be written into new labor contracts.

Stack cited veterans administration records showing that in the week ended Jan. 19 more than 777,000 veterans drew \$1 unemployment compensation and 232,070 filed new claims.

IOOF and Rebekahs To Draw Plans For State Convention

IOOF and Rebekah lodge members will meet in special session with state officers at the lodge hall here Saturday at 8 p. m. to discuss preparations for the state grand lodge scheduled for Medford May 19-23. Clothing Shortage Acute Until Fall Unless Prices Rise

New York, Jan. 31.—(U.P.)—The shortage of men's clothing will continue acute until next fall unless OPA drops the maximum average price regulation which is "hamstringing" production, Carrol D. Newell declared last night.

Newell, a woolen company executive and former chief of the woolen and worsted section of the war production board, spoke at a dinner meeting of the woolen wholesalers' national association.

He said industry had no quarrel with the price ceiling program.

He says the shortage has reduced wheat shipments from the inland empire to Columbia river and Puget Sound ports.
