

JAP WINDS CODE TIPS OFF SNEAK PEARL ASSAULT

War Department Had 72
Hours Advance Notice
from Jap, Captain Claims.

Washington, Feb. 1.—(U.P.)—The Pearl Harbor committee heard today that the Navy department ordered communications officers to keep their mouths shut and destroy any notes they had regarding events of the Pearl Harbor week-end.

Navy Capt. L. F. Safford, 1941 chief of the communications security section, said the order was given him by his superiors "in the name of the chief of naval operations."

He said the order was given orally about the middle of the week following the Dec. 7, 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor.

Washington, Feb. 1.—(U.P.)—Navy Capt. L. F. Safford said today the war and navy departments in Washington had 72 hours advance notice of the Pearl Harbor attack from the Japanese themselves.

He based his statement on firm belief that Japan did send a so-called "winds code" message which was intercepted on Dec. 4, 1941, indicating an impending break in relations with the United States. Other material in the hands of the war and navy departments in Washington, he said, pointed to Pearl Harbor as the spot of the first attack.

Knew "Winds Code"

Safford, who was chief of the navy department's communications security section in December, 1941, made his statements to the congressional Pearl Harbor investigating committee.

He was one of the few naval officers in Washington who knew of the "winds code" which Japan set up to notify her diplomats abroad of a break in relations, or war, with the United States, Great Britain or Russia.

Previous witnesses before the committee have denied knowledge that the winds code ever was used.

"There was a winds message. It meant war and we knew it meant war," Safford said in a 22-page statement at the start of his testimony.

He insisted that Japan "executed" its winds code on Dec.

4, 1941, that it was intercepted and decoded by the navy, and the information passed along to the army.

He concluded with the flat assertion: "The war and navy departments have been given 72 hours advance notification of the attack on Pearl Harbor by the Japanese themselves."

Safford told the congressional committee that: "1. Japan broadcast the 'winds' message—meaning war with the U. S. and Great Britain—from Station JAP (Tokyo) at 8:30 a. m. (Washington time) on Dec. 4, 1941.

In Morse Code

2. The broadcast "probably" was in Japanese Morse code.

3. It was intercepted by the U. S. naval radio receiving station at Cheltenham, Md., and recorded on a special typewriter which types the Roman-letter equivalent of Japanese characters.

4. The intercepted message was teletyped to the navy department communication intelligence under his command.

"I saw the winds message typed in page form on yellow teletype paper, with the translation written below," he said.

"I immediately forwarded this message to my commanding officer (Rear Adm. Leigh Noyes) thus fully discharging my responsibility in the matter."

He said he got word within a few minutes the message had been delivered.

Safford was called to the stand after the committee heard Adm. W. W. Smith, former chief of staff of the Pacific fleet, testify that he believed Japan would not have attacked the fleet on the U. S. west coast as it did at Pearl Harbor.

GI Museum Shows

Reich-Banned Art

Worcester, Mass. — (U.P.)—The Worcester art museum is exhibiting a group of paintings by contemporary German artists which the Third Reich banned.

Collected by the Nierendorf gallery of New York, the paintings emphasize expressive content and deliberately distort form for emotional effect. They were banned by the nazis because they epitomized freedom of expression, social criticism, and distorted forms of art.

Paintings from the Germanic and Fogg Museums of Harvard university and the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston were loaned for the exhibition.

BABY-PARKING SERVICE

IS FORMED BY DOCTORS

San Diego (U.P.)—More than 110 doctors and dentists here, worried by children scampering about their offices while parents were being treated, have banded together to form a baby-parking service for mothers.

Under supervision of a registered nurse and with a trained staff, the "toddler parking lot" will accommodate about 75 children a day. Any more than that, say the doctors, will still have to race around the offices.

VET KIN PERMIT HAS CATCH IN IT

Washington, Feb. 1.—(U.P.)—Dependents of soldiers of all ranks will be permitted to join their soldier kin serving overseas when accommodations are available, provided the soldiers agree to remain at least a year after their kin arrive, it was learned today at the war department.

The war department is authorized by law to provide full transportation for the kin of officers and the top three grades of enlisted men.

The army announced this week it would send these dependents overseas beginning this spring.

Dependents of all other ranks will be carried without charge, except for meals, on government transports, under the new plan, it was learned.

The war department is not now authorized by law to provide transportation for the dependents of soldiers below the top three enlisted grades on public carriers in this country, but means are being sought whereby such transportation can be provided.

board's 860,000 shares. An opening block of 165,000 Commonwealth & Southern warrants at 5/16 helped swell the curb volume total.

The betterment in prices which spread to all securities markets reflected belief that more and more pressure was being applied to end the steel and General Motors strikes.

Steel shares generally were higher. New highs were registered in Acme Steel, Jones & Laughlin preferred B, and Vandalia, U. S. Steel rose a fraction while Bethlehem gained more than a point.
