

PEACHES DIVORCED FOR SECOND TIME, PLANS VACATION

Reno, Nev., Feb. 1.—(U.P.)—Wearing a mink swaggar coat and what she called "that free again smile," Mrs. Frances Heenan Browning Haynes Clivell—the former renowned "Peaches" Browning—today divorced San Francisco department store executive Joseph C. Clivell.

"Peaches" whose marriage in 1926 to elderly, eccentric New York millionaire Edward W. "Daddy" Browning created a sensation across the nation, charged mental cruelty.

Wed In 1941 She married Clivell in Gardnerville, Nev., July 29, 1941. A sealed property agreement settled property rights.

Mrs. Clivell took the same mink-coated stroll from nearby swank Riverside hotel to the Washoe county courthouse she took in 1937 when she divorced Bernard Hynes, wealthy Denver, Colo., theater magnate.

Asked "who's next?" "Peaches" smiled sweetly, then retorted:

"I think I'll spend the next few weeks getting organized." As an afterthought, she added: "But then, you never know about these men, do you? I might marry anybody. Who knows?" "Peaches" said all her ex-husbands were "darlings."

"I think Mr. Clivell is simply wonderful," she said. "But sometimes men have to be more than just wonderful."

The former 16-year-old, pretty blonde showgirl who married "Daddy" Browning is now 35 and a brunette—and still attractive.

Following Daddy's death, she was awarded one third of the income from the wealthy New Yorker's vast real estate holdings, valued from \$3,000,000 to \$7,000,000.

She married Hynes at Tuckahoe, N. Y., in 1934, divorcing him here three years later. In 1941 she eloped with Clivell at Gardnerville, Nev.

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Greenwich Refuses To be Recommended For Capital of UNO

Greenwich, Conn., Feb. 1.—(U.P.)—While scores of cities jockeyed for the honor of being the world capital, 200 residents asked today that Greenwich be counted out.

Led by Wilkie Bushby, lawyer and educator, the group said it wouldn't want Greenwich to be the permanent home of the United Nations Organization. They said they weren't hostile, but they simply thought the UNO "plunked down in Greenwich" would be too disturbing and would take up too much space.

They added that it wasn't a case of sour grapes either. They said they heard from reliable sources that their area headed the list of sites to be recommended to the UNO by the inspection committee.

MANILA WATER FRONT WORKMEN ON STRIKE

Manila, Feb. 1.—(U.P.)—An estimated 12,000 water front workers struck today to enforce wage demands and U. S. army authorities immediately announced the walkout would not be allowed to interfere with discharge of army cargoes nor the return home of eligible soldiers.

More than 3,000 troops from port stevedore companies and technical service units were ordered to begin unloading army ships. It was emphasized, however, that no civilian ships would be touched.

CAR KILLS DOG, BLIND FOR PAST EIGHT YEARS

Baker, Feb. 1.—(U.P.)—Skipen, a 15-year-old fox terrier is dead today because his sixth lucky sense failed him.

Austrian Children On Way to Former Homes, Clark Says

Vienna.—(U.P.)—Ten thousand undernourished Austrian children between the ages of six and ten soon will be going from the American Zone of Occupation to Switzerland and rural Austria under a new rehabilitation program, says a report from Gen. Mark Clark's headquarters USFA (United States Forces Austria).

These children will be sent away for a period of three months during which they will be given increased diets, proper clothing and medical care. Under this scheme, which was worked out by USFA Public Welfare representatives, Austrian welfare officials and Swiss charity organizations, 1,429 Austrian children already were transferred to Switzerland during the last month, and about 1,000 more are scheduled to go this month. Additionally, about another 500 children will be

evacuated from the American Zone of Occupation to the farms for the same rehabilitation purposes.

JAP OFFICER TO HANG FOR YANK EXECUTIONS

Manila, Feb. 1.—(U.P.)—Lt. Gen. Hikotaro Tajima, former commander of Japanese forces on the Bataan islands north of Luzon, was sentenced today to be hanged after a U. S. military court convicted him of ordering the execution of three U. S. naval fliers who were forced down in November, 1944.

VETERANS RETURN

San Diego, Feb. 1.—(U.P.)—The USS Wakefield, coast guard-manned transport, was due here today with 6,653 high-point veterans, most of them from the first and sixth marine divisions. A gala celebration will welcome the Wakefield and four accompanying vessels, the destroyers Orleck and Craig and the YP's 889 and 890.

Disabled Veteran Gets Contract For Work In Pictures

Cambridge, Mass.—(U.P.)—Harold Russell, a former army sergeant who lost both hands in a training accident, has accepted a Hollywood contract to act in a movie concerning a wounded veteran returning home.

He will be paid \$500 a week for a minimum of five months and will appear in the play with Fredric March and Dana Andrews. Russell was injured at

Camp McCall, N. C., in June, 1944, when he was hospitalized for seven months.

After learning to typewrite, shave, write letters and dress with the aid of mechanical hands, he participated in a rehabilitation movie prepared by the Treasury Department for the Victory Loan Drive.

At present, Russell is a student at Boston university. Before the war he was a chain store meat department manager.
