Regent Reviews D.A.R. Projects For Chapter Here

In deference to new members of the chapter, Mrs. Lowry read a letter from Mrs. J. Y. Talmadge, president general, explaining the use of the auditorium in the DAR building in Washington, D. C. The letter also told of the society's long-standing program in Americanism and told of the handbook used in conducting Americanism classes, stating that more than seven million copies of the books have been distributed free of charge.

In reviewing the many projects sponsored by the society, Mrs. Lowry told of furnishing motion picture equipment for Tamasee and the Kate Duncan Smith schools, both of which were equipped and are entirely supported by the organization.

A new project of interest is construction of a new Tower of Bells at Valley Forge, Mrs. Lowry reported. In the tower space will be provided for plates on which members may have inscribed names of relatives who saw service in either World War I or II and the names of Revolutionary ancestors. State and individual chapters will also be provided marker space and Mrs. Lowry announced that Oregon would be represented. It was voted that Crater Lake chapter also secure space.

Mrs. Lowry told of the rapid growth of Oregon membership and it was stated that Crater Lake chapter had an increase of 14 new members during the last two years.

During a short business meeting a contribution was made to the March of Dimes and a donation also made towards purchase of an Oregon history to be presented to the state library.

The F. L. club met Monday evening at the home of Mrs. Ernest C. Conrac for a business meeting followed by refresh-



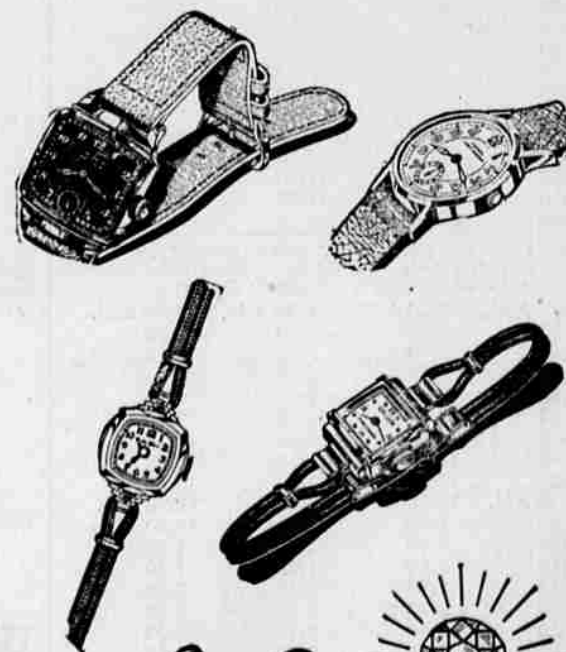
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
