Navy Remains Only Unbeaten Major College Basketball Team in Nation

New York, Feb. 4.—(U.P.)—The race for national collegiate basketball honors, scrambled last week-end by upsets which left Navy the only major unbeaten team, was expected to clear this week as the schedule, seemingly tailor-made for the records, sent top-ranking teams against each other in "eliminations."

Navy Not Ranked
Despite its perfect record in seven games, Navy was not ranked as the best in the nation, and Iowa, Oklahoma A. & M., Notre Dame, New York university, Kentucky and Indiana, all were rated on a par with the Middies, who beat Columbia last Saturday, 62 to 41.

West Virginia, DePaul, Holy Cross, Duke and Ohio State also had their fans.
However, some order was bound to appear after this week's games, which match Notre Dame (13 won, one lost) against New York university (12-1) at New York; a "spoiler" Temple five against Duke at Philadelphia; and Holy Cross (10-1) versus Yale (12-1).

Aggies Draw Toughie
Much interest will center on Chicago Friday and Saturday as the Oklahoma Aggies, whose only loss in 16 games was a defeat by DePaul, meet DePaul, Bowling Green and Hamline in a tournament.
Other cut-throat midwestern games pit Indiana and Ohio State, currently tied for second place in the Big Ten, on Saturday night, and Purdue against Iowa Saturday. Purdue provided one of the season's surprises last Saturday by walloping Minnesota, 65 to 40, while Iowa coasted over Chicago, 68 to 36.
Northwestern edged Notre Dame, 56 to 55, on Mox Mossis' last-minute fielder, snapping the Irish winning streak at 13 games.

Central Point, Feb. 4.—Phoenix high's cage aggregation will contend with the Central Point Pointers in an infantile paralysis benefit game here tomorrow evening. Demaret Takes Top Honors At Tucson, Circuit Moves On

Tucson, Ariz., Feb. 4.—(U.P.)—The winter golf circuit moved on to San Antonio for the Texas open today after Jimmy Demaret of Houston won the Tucson open yesterday with a score that broke one record and tied another.

His total for the 72 holes tied the tournament record set by Ray Mangrum in winning the meet last year, and his seven-under-par 63 on the second round as a new record for the El Rio course.

He finished four strokes ahead of Herman Barron of White Plains, N. Y., and took down \$1,500 for the victory. Barron carded a 67 on the final round, two less than Demaret needed, but the Texan's lead was too big to affect the final outcome.

NAZI EFFORT TO END SOVEREIGNTY OF NATIONS TOLD

Nuernberg, Feb. 4.—(U.P.)—Germany's "criminal premeditation" to destroy the sovereignty of western European nations was proved by her total annexation of Luxembourg, French Prosecutor Edgar Faure told the International War Crimes Tribunal today.

The same pattern of "systematic crime" and "Germanization" carried out in Alsace-Lorraine, Holland and Denmark was a plot against Luxembourg's freedom involving every branch of the German government, Faure charged.

Citizenship Offered

The prosecutor said special efforts were made to Nazify Luxembourg. German citizenship was offered the inhabitants. Those who refused to pledge allegiance to Hitler were either deported or shot. Five hundred were sentenced to death for this reason by emergency Gestapo tribunals. "as in Alsace-Lorraine," Faure told the court, "the Germans attempted to exterminate all national sentiment." Luxembourgers were forced to take Germanized family and Christian names.

The prosecutor said Luxembourg's youth was a particular target of the Nazification program. Teachers were forced to read Mein Kampf, and students were required to give their professors the Nazi salute.

Authorities Involved

Not only Nazi party members, Faure continued, but German diplomats, military authorities and police were involved in the plot to usurp the sovereign power of European countries.

In Denmark, the prosecutor charged, the Nazis began their first efforts to Germanize the population before the war with propaganda and through organization of the Danish Nazi party. Next, storm trooper units were established in South Jutland, slowly spreading through Denmark. Nazi financial groups also were created to gain financial control of the country.

"Germany sought to establish the fiction that Denmark was not an occupied country," Faure said, "because she was unable to offer military resistance to invasion."

The all-day meeting of Jackson county Pomona Grange held Jan. 26 at Bellview was attended by over 100 Grangers from all parts of the county.

Two resolutions from Pomona granges in northern parts of the state were endorsed and sent to the State Grange for further consideration, as was also one from Josephine county Pomona in regard to legislation to speed up the certification of certain seed crops. It was pointed out that many sales of Ladino clover seed were lost on account of the seed not being ready for market at the proper time.

Lecture hour consisted of musical numbers and skits by Phoenix and Bellview granges and an interesting talk by O. H. Bengtson on juvenile delinquency.
Next regular meeting of Pomona will be at Gold Hill in April.
