In my opinion none of these astonishing maneuvers is quite so efficient in practice as Schafer's manual prone-pressure, although some advocates of the teeter-totter method do claim it gives greater air exchange than the Schafer method. Moreover, it does seem unlikely that a suitable board and a sawhorse or other fulcrum would be available in many such emergencies, and the important question is, what are you going to do while awaiting the arrival of the necessary equipment?

FELDMAN, OLSON MERGE BUSINESS

Japan Cotton Needs Said 200,000 Tons

Tokyo, Feb. 4.—(U.P.)—Japan must import 200,000 tons of cotton this year to meet her minimum needs, but any additional imports can be re-exported as finished goods to relieve a world textile shortage in conformity with a recent U. S. state department directive. Allied headquarters said today.

The headquarters statement quoted Fred Taylor, international textile expert, as confirming Gen. Douglas MacArthur's original estimate that Japan will need 200,000 tons of cotton for internal consumption.

When Horace Greeley popularized the phrase "Go West, young man," it was generally good advice and easy to follow. Young men obediently hitched up their oxen or oiled up their shoes and lit out for the sage country. The result was quite a boom in the post-war West—post-Civil War, that is.

No Westerner would deny the advantages of a post-World War II boom—but this time it will depend upon moving industries as well as people. Unfortunately, Horace Greeley isn't around to give us a lift; but his shoes are being filled admirably by a number of other people—and they're doing very nicely, thank you.

Transplanting a factory is somewhat more complicated than moving a footloose young man... and it takes a bit more selling. The job has been undertaken by utilities, banks, business firms, and Chambers of Commerce all over the West.

Smartly and aggressively, they're training the big guns of modern persuasion on eastern firms. Some of them are offering engineers to iron out the difficulties of re-locating a plant—surveying sites, measuring markets, looking into transportation, hunting up raw materials. Others are scheduling advertisements in national magazines. Still others are mailing out brochures and writing sales letters.
