Tony Galento Eyes Shot At World Boxing Crown

Orange, N. J., Feb. 5.—(U.P.)—The little fat man still thinks he can chain black lightning.
Tony Galento, the old two-ton guy who now comes closer to weighing three, made that clear today as he challenged Joe Louis to give him another crack at the world heavyweight championship.

"I'll stiffen the bum if he ever gives me another chance," Galento proclaimed with all his old-time modesty.
Galento, the belligerent bartender, was very serious. Waving arms that protruded like the flippers on a penguin, the barrel who walks like a man declared that it was a matter of honor. Tony doesn't need the money, it says here.

"I'll fight him for free," Tony roared. "I'm not trying to capulize (Galentoism) on my fightin' ability. I'll take the bum on for Veterans' Rehabilitation (more Galentoism.)"
Training Tony is somewhat of a problem. Willis (The Beard) Glizenberg revealed as Tony stepped to the front to help five arguing customers to the sidewalk.

Good Appetite
"I had him in the gym and I got him down to 250, once," The Beard sighed. "So that afternoon Tony drinks 18 bottles of beer and eats six southern fried chickens—honest, and he's right back where we started."

That appetite has upstaged an additional 37 pounds onto Tony's beach-ball frame since the June night in 1939 when Galento rocked Louis before being kayoed in the fourth round.

Tony came back to knock out Lou Nova in a bloody brawl at Philadelphia but then was kayoed himself by Max Baer in 1940. The next year he tumbled before Max's brother, Buddy, and the Galento prize ring saga ended.

Glassa Cuts Lip
"I shoulda beat Max and Buddy, too," Tony groaned. "If I had I'd probably be the Number One contender right now—like I should be. But just before that fight with Max my brother, Russell, hit me with a beer glass and cut my lip all up. I shouldn't have fought Max the way my lip was."

Now, nearing 37 and with the big heavyweight gates again in sight, the Beer Barrel Piker is getting ideas. He can't forget how he staggered the champ in the first round and then dropped Louis on the canvas in the third round of their title fight. So, drawing himself up to his full five feet, nine inches, Tony demands another shot and proclaims:
"This time I'd stiffen the bum."

Shaughnessy Quits Head Job at Pitt; Goes to Maryland

Pittsburgh, Feb. 5.—(U.P.)—Clark Shaughnessy, the "T" formation expert who was unable to produce a winner at the University of Pittsburgh in three seasons, packed his bags today after resigning under fire.

RED CROSS HOME SERVICE AID TO RETURNING VETS

Veterans were reminded today by the home service department of the Red Cross that this agency has intensified its efforts to aid veterans in obtaining all benefits due them and that the entire home service program has been broadened to aid the veteran and his family in every possible way.

Red Cross aid for claims service dates back to 1917. It is pointed out, the Red Cross having been asked in that year to aid the Bureau of War Risk Insurance to cooperate with them in administering government benefits. Later the Red Cross was legally authorized to present veterans' claims before the Veterans' Administration.

Workers Trained
Home service workers are well trained in all phases of this work. It is declared, and are qualified to offer accurate information concerning the various types of federal benefits and the necessary procedures in applying for these; are prepared to assist in preparing applications for these benefits; assist in obtaining documentary evidence and affidavits required for the support of the claims; assist in the preparation of appeals; correspond with area home service officers in regard to general information and interpret Veterans' Administration decisions to claimants.

MISSING BRITISH UNIT FOUND IN MASS GRAVE

San Francisco, Feb. 5.—(U.P.)—A mass grave containing the bodies of 492 members of a British artillery regiment missing since the fall of Singapore has been found on a lonely island off the coast of Bougainville, Melbourne radio said today.

The men had either been shot through the head or decapitated "since the surrender of Japan," the broadcast said, quoting an unidentified Royal Australian Air Force captain who just returned from Bougainville to Sydney.
