

AMERICANISM IS NEED OF WORLD DUBACH DECLARES

"If Americans would firmly believe and follow the principles for which their own flag stands we could transform the world in a generation." This was the keynote of an address by Dean U. G. Dubach, Oregon State College, before the Medford Rotary club Tuesday.

Speaking at a luncheon meeting at the Hotel Medford, Dubach said that Americans today have the power but lack the willingness for establishing world peace. Christianity was cited as the force needed to balance the destructive power of the atomic bomb. It is Christianity which has raised the standards of living in countries where it has spread.

Four Steps Cited

Dean Dubach cited four necessary steps which should be immediately taken by the U. S. to bring order out of the confusion now so world-wide in scope. First of all, Americans must learn to understand the other people of the world. As a second step they must recognize and accept their responsibility in feeding the world as misery and starvation breeds revolution and war. We must also take our wonderful educational system to other parts of the world. By teaching new methods we can raise the economic standards of other countries. Recognizing that "the price of greatness is the assumption of responsibility," Dubach stressed the need for America to assume political leadership at once.

We have lost face in Europe, the Dean said. Europeans believe that America is not yet fitted for world leadership when she cannot control her army abroad and solve her problems of a domestic nature.

Dean Dubach was introduced by Archie Pierce.

GERMANS STOLE ART COLLECTIONS SYSTEMATICALLY

Nuernberg, Feb. 6—(U.P.)—French Prosecutor M. Gerthoff said at the war crimes trial today that the Germans engaged in a "systematic and disciplined" campaign to steal public and private art collections in western Europe.

He said the art seizures were organized thievery despite an order by Adolf Hitler which contended they should be regarded "not as an expropriation but as a transfer to our care as a guarantee for peace negotiations."

He cited Field Marshal William Keitel's order making Alfred Rosenberg responsible for the seizure of art works and documents.

Approved By Hitler

He also cited evidence that Hitler approved Rosenberg's suggestion in December, 1941, for the seizure of Jewish property and furniture in western Europe for the German administration in the east.

Gerthoff said Rosenberg in a letter written in 1942 cited the Nazis' 20-year battle against the Jews "as an honorable basis" for presenting seized art works to the party.

He said that in January, 1941, confiscated works totaled 21,903 objects valued at a billion reichsmarks.

30,000 SOULS IN KLAMATH REGION

Klamath Falls, Feb. 6—Public school officials said here Tuesday that 1946 school census figures indicate a total population of more than 30,000 in the Klamath Falls city zone—the city and its immediate suburbs.

The school census showed 7549 children of school age in this zone. At the generally accepted ratio of 4 to 1 for estimating the total population on the basis of the school census, the total is more than 30,000 population. The 1940 federal census figure for the same area was approximately 26,000.

School census for the entire county is 11,576, indicating a county population of more than 47,000. The 1940 census population of Klamath county was 40,497.

Deadline March 1 On Dog Licenses

George Meade, county dog control man, today called attention to dog owners that licenses for their pets must be purchased by March 1 to avoid penalty.

Licenses for dogs, regardless of sex, cost \$1.50 if purchased before March 1 and will be \$3.50 after that date, Meade said. A fine of \$10 and court costs plus the purchase price of a license will be assessed owners whose dogs are found without licenses after the deadline.

The ruling applies throughout the county, it was stated.

The couple lay on the floor of their auto court apartment when two friends called upon them. The visitors, unable to arouse anyone, forced their way into the place and saved the lives of Harris and his wife, officers reported.

Because of cold weather, the young couple left a gas heater on all night. There was no vent to carry off the fumes, and concentrated carbon monoxide gas rendered the man and woman unconscious. Their doctor reported. They are expected to recover.

When she returned home this morning, she said, she found all doors of the house locked and gained entry by crawling through a rear window.

Her daughter's body was sprawled on the floor of the living room. Police said Miss Jenkins apparently had been strangled some time before midnight.
