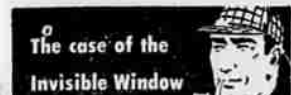


Sports

The commission also gave permission for a 60-day greyhound racing season from May 14 to July 26.

The district four basketball tournament between high school teams of Klamath Falls, Ashland, Grants Pass and Medford will be held at the Southern Oregon College of Education gym in Ashland March 1 and 2. The college is sponsoring the meet this year, mainly because nobody else wanted it. Despite the fact that they are definitely not in favor of the tourney, Medford school officials said it could be held here since it had been voted in but SOCE took over to keep the meet an Ashland affair.

We have absolutely no use for the tournament and can see no conceivable reason why it should be played. If Southern Oregon league play should end in a tie we could see a playoff between the two top teams but can't see any use of dragging the others in on another crack at the gravy.

If coaches of the four competing schools want a tournament it would receive our stamp of approval if they would do away with league play. Why have both? League play loses its purpose when the teams know they have to go through a tournament to gain a berth in the race for the state championship.

Any team might have a bad night and drop a tournament game after thoroughly outclassing all league opposition. Just suppose a last place team should happen to get "hot" and win the tournament. It wouldn't be a fair representation of the district to send them to the state tournament but they would be the ones to go because they won a couple of games after being kicked around all season. Some business, isn't it?

Of course, a team which is of championship calibre should be able to sweep their league and also the tournament. But our argument is why have both? Without the league, high school teams in the district could book considerably more outside games and give their hometown fans a better chance to see outside competition in action. Let us hope school officials see the light of day next year and cut out one or the other.

Contrary to a story printed elsewhere, there will be NO spring football practice at Medford high school. To begin with, Bill Bowerman, who will handle the coaching reins next fall, is absolutely not in favor of a spring football practice even if the Oregon High School Activities Association would allow it. Bowerman said track will start a few days after basketball season ends and all football men are urged to report for the cinder sport.

Medford Ramblers, originally in the Southern Oregon independent hoop league, are back in the circuit under Bowerman's policy to provide athletic recreation for as many high school boys as possible. The Ramblers were forced to abandon when they lost J.C. Tucker, their coach, but have again been organized under the watchful eye of Alex McDonald. They will replace the Medford junior varsity in the circuit.

Basketball fans probably will see a close and hot game here tonight when Medford tangles with Klamath Falls at the South Oakdale casaba emporium. The pelicans bowed to Medford on their own court Jan. 15 but their 52 to 26 pasting of Ashland last Saturday night convinced us that the Pels have come to the front and are a team not to be sold short.

Its a heavy schedule that's facing the Black Tornado for the next week. They take on the highly-touted Oakland Boys Club here Saturday night, travel to Ashland for a king-s-x frolic Monday night, move to Eugene Tuesday for a mix with the Oregon Frosh and return here in the last conference game of the season, against Ashland, Friday night. The curtain rings down with a Feb. 22 and 23 meeting with Bend on the Central Oregon floor.

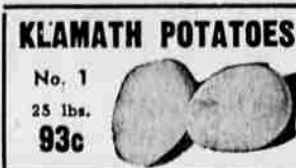
