

## CAMPAIGN URGED AGAINST TRUCK OVERLOADS HERE

The state highway commission has called on Jackson county authorities to invoke more vigorous action against overloaded logging trucks on local roads.

So far this month 27 cases of overloaded trucks have been filed, 15 of them between Febru-

ary 1 and 4. Overloads ran from 5000 to 7000 pounds, according to the district attorney. Increased fines, limiting hauling to daylight hours with none on Saturday afternoons and Sunday are among the steps proposed to curb overloading.

It is also charged truck operators hold back late in the day until the weighing station is closed, and then move.

The state highway commission has taken the suggested action in several upstate sections. The highway body is concerned about wear and tear on the highways from overloads. The county court is concerned similarly about overloads on county roads, repair of which is slowed by inability to get new equipment or repair material for old machines.

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## PHOENIX, TALENT MERGER ELECTION TO BE SET SOON

A meeting of the county school district boundary board to be held within a day or two will determine the date and time for election in the Phoenix and Talent school districts on consolidation of the two, County School Superintendent C. R. Bowman said this morning.

Petitions, one from Phoenix bearing 113 signatures and the other from Talent with 75 names listed have been filed with Bowman who is secretary of the boundary board. Bowman declared that the election would undoubtedly occur within the next two weeks. State law requires that three notices be posted in each district for 10 days prior to the voting. One notice in each district must be placed at the school and the others in prominent places.

Who May Vote Bowman emphasizes that the only ones allowed to vote are citizens of the United States who are 21 years of age, who have been residents of the district for 30 days immediately preceding the election and who are shown by the last assessment rolls to be subject to a tax on real or personal property within the district (that is, one whose name is on the last assessment rolls).

Ownership of stock in a company, corporation or partnership within the district is acceptable in lieu of property qualification. However, one cannot attain voting eligibility by having the sheriff enter his name on the tax rolls after the assessor has turned the rolls over to the sheriff.

Superintendent Bowman and school officials have stressed that the petitions are not to be used as a measure of favoritism toward the merger as signers have merely indicated their willingness to stage an election on the proposal.

Others on the boundary board in addition to the school superintendent are the county judge and commissioners.

## Ralph Southwick, Veteran of WW I, Dies In Portland

Ralph H. Southwick of 915 West Tenth street, Medford, passed away at the Veterans' Hospital in Portland Tuesday. Funeral services will be held in the A. J. Rose and son chapel in Portland at 11 a. m. Saturday, with interment in Lincoln Memorial park, Portland.

Mr. Southwick had recently completed a three-year contract as a storekeeper with the naval air base at Kodiak, Alaska. He was brought to the naval hospital in Seattle for emergency treatment and later transferred to the Portland hospital.

The deceased was born at Walla Walla Jan. 1, 1891. He was a veteran of the first world war, having served in the navy.

Survivors are his wife, Edith, who resides at the family address, and two daughters, Mrs. Doris Root Medford, and Mrs. Betty Jo Daugherty, Darby, Pa. Other survivors are his father, Emmett E. Southwick of San Diego, Calif., and several brothers and sisters, Mrs. Ruth Wilson, San Diego, Elmer and Otho Southwick of Wallawa, Fred of Roseburg, Frank, Lawrence and Maurice, all of San Diego.

## SOCE Enrollment Largest Since '41

Southern Oregon College, Ashland, Feb. 8.—Final registration figures for the winter term at the Southern Oregon college shows a larger enrollment than at any time since the spring of 1941-1942 according to Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, president.

Winter enrollment this year of 154 students is an increase of 136 per cent over the same period a year ago. Women increased 36 per cent and men 538 per cent. Seventy-seven per cent of all men enrolled at the college are veterans, most of whom are attending under the G. I. bill.

Students enrolled in junior college offerings and the secretarial science curriculum account for 84 per cent of the total number enrolled.
