Women's Society Meets Wednesday

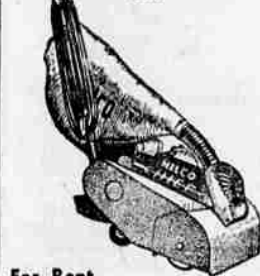

Roy E. Dickerson, author, lecturer, and nationally known authority in the field of social hygiene, will speak at a conference in Klamath Falls Monday under auspices of the Klamath County Public Health association. It was announced here today. Attending the meeting, which is open to the public, will be Robert Elder, Jackson County juvenile officer, and representatives of the local welfare commission, Girl and Boy Scout organizations, Jackson County health department, and schools.

The session will begin at 10:30 a. m. with a leaders' meeting at Veterans Memorial building in Klamath Falls. Symposium topic will be "Social Hygiene Education, Your Job and Mine." Mr. Dickerson will speak on "safeguarding the Home" at a 12 o'clock luncheon at the Willard hotel, and again at 2 p. m. at a general session, also scheduled at the hotel. His topic then will be "The Parents' Part in Sex Education."

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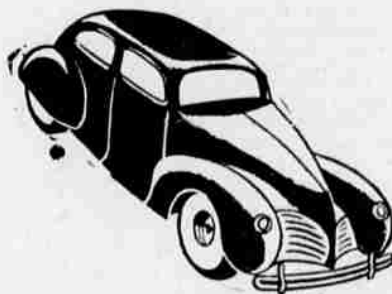
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
