

STAR EXPLOSION 1000 YEARS AGO JUST DISCOVERED

Phenomena May Aid Atomic
Research—Now Visible In
Eastern Sky

Williams Bay, Wis., Feb. 11.—(U.P.)—An atomic explosion that occurred 1,000 years ago—and millions of times more powerful than the most devastating atom bomb—was discovered Saturday in an outburst of a star in the eastern sky.

The explosion of the star, known as T Coronae Borealis, was observed at the Yerkes observatory here.

Astronomers throughout the world were alerted to watch for the phenomena which Dr. Otto Struve, Yerkes observatory director, said may be of the highest importance, and which might prove valuable in atomic research.

He said the explosion essentially is the same release of atomic energy, magnified millions of times as that which occurred Aug. 6, 1945 when the U. S. air corps dropped an atomic bomb, leveling Hiroshima, Japan. The explosion in the heavens is the result of internal bursting through the outer crust of the star at the rate of 3,000 miles per second. The star T exploded at least once before—as observed in 1866—but little was known of that explosion because only few records were made of it and the star itself gradually faded until it was scarcely visible.

M'NEAL TRACES SOCO PROGRESS SINCE PIONEERS

Southern Oregon College, Ashland, Feb. 11.—In "The Cavalcade of Southern Oregon College", R. W. McNeal of the college geography department gave an unusual presentation of the development of higher education in this section. McNeal, speaking before a large and enthusiastic audience at the regular Wednesday Soco program, outlined the development of public education and higher education in Southern Oregon from 1869 to the present date.

Speaking of the history of Southern Oregon College McNeal said, "The story of the history of Southern Oregon College impresses us with the fact that, from its beginnings, the life of the institution has depended upon the constant waterfulness and sustained support of southern Oregon citizens. The most ominous threat that any institution faces, be that institution political, spiritual, or economic, is the threat of complacency and dormancy. When an educational institution becomes dormant it is on its way to oblivion."

Fine Heritage

"Those who have preceded us and who fought so valiantly for higher education in Southern Oregon have left us a magnificent heritage we cannot escape. We of the present generation must be indeed unworthy if we fail to improve and expand their heritage. To us is given not alone the responsibility but the high privilege of continuing to build upon the foundation laid down by Southern Oregon's pioneers in higher education."

Referring to the present college McNeal said, "The opportunities offered to Southern Oregon College today are far greater than offered at any time in the past. To transform these opportunities into helpful realities will require the individual personal effort of each of us, as well as the cooperative effort of students, faculty and community."

Referring to recent action of the State Board of Higher Education in selecting Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson as the new president of the Southern Oregon College McNeal then said, "The board has selected for us a man upon whose shoulders they could place the responsibility of reactivating and re-vitalizing our college. With his leadership we shall endeavor to bring to Southern Oregon the realization of its hopes and dreams for an institution of high standing among the colleges and universities of our nation; an institution toward which the thought of thousands of alumnae who will be serving humanity throughout the world can turn with admiration and pride."

Mrs. Henry Galey, Albert Joy, and Mrs. Alice Piel of Ashland spoke briefly on activities of the "Old Normal School" (1895-1909). Mrs. Alice Apple gate Piel who was in charge of the teacher-training in the institution is a granddaughter of the pioneer surveyor of the old "southern emigrant road" over which the first wagon train of 42 wagons reached the valley just one hundred years ago.

POPULATION GAIN SHOWN FOR STATE IN BIRTHS, DEATHS

A net population gain of 10,707 occurred in the state of Oregon in 1945 according to statistics compiled by the registrar, Oregon State Board of Health, on totals for births and deaths from the official register.

The net is arrived at by deducting the total of 12,155 deaths from the 22,862 births.

The aggregate of births for the 12 months, or 22,862, is a drop of 2.64 per cent from the 23,483 for the previous year, according to the report.

However, deaths showed a greater percentage drop of 7.9, taking the 1,056 difference between 13,211 in 1944 and 12,155 in 1945 and figuring it percentage-wise.

The figures for births are calculated according to residence of the mother, and for deaths according to residence of the deceased.

WORLD EATING TO DROP THIS YEAR

Washington, Feb. 11.—(U.P.)—World food consumption in 1946 will fall 12 per cent below pre-war levels with the result that some nations will approach starvation, the agriculture department said Saturday.

The department added that a world survey showed little improvement is in prospect in 1947. The yield of food crops may rise but production of livestock is likely to slump further because of the shortage of feed grains.

Only in the United States will civilians this year eat more than ever before in history, the department said.

Even Canada, one of the few other surplus producing nations will consume less than in some war years.
