

FIVE MEDFORD MEN SIGN FOR NAVY TRAINING

Five Medford men were recent naval enlistees according to Theodore Werder, CWT, of the U. S. navy recruiting substation here.

The men are: Robert J. Clutter, son of Mr. and Mrs. John S. Clutter; Russell J. Stubblefield, son of Mrs. Maude E. Lien; Eugene D. Hinds, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Hinds; Earl Roger Hibbard, son of Mrs. Charlotte P. Hall; and Richard S. Cottingham, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Cottingham.

Hibbard, enlisting as a seaman first-class, has been sent to a naval electronics school for training in radio, radar and allied courses.

Recruiting Officer Werder, a veteran of ten years service, assumed duty here recently and succeeds J. F. Acosta, CEM who

is being transferred to Portland. Werder points out the value of naval electronic training saying that television, telegraph and telephone industries are eagerly seeking ex-naval electronics men for their technical staffs.

COAST GUARD TO KEEP OFFICE HERE OPEN TWO DAYS

The United States Coast Guard recruiting office, room 222, in the federal building, is now open until noon on Monday and Tuesday, Chief Roger Herendeen announced today.

Heretofore, Herendeen explained, the coast guard has not had a permanent office in southern Oregon, but with recruiting results improving and an increase in enthusiastic inquiries, it has been decided that the office remain open the two mornings for those interested.

For young men interested in the almost endless types of duty which the coast guard performs, now is an excellent time to consider enlistment. Chief Herendeen said. Now open to the recruit following basic training are numerous training schools such as aerographer's mate, aviation machinist's mate, carpenter's mate, radar operator, radio-man, pharmacist's mate, loan operator, motor machinist's mate, telephone electrician mate, parachute rigger, fireman and many others, soon to be available. Men accepted are sent to Portland for final enlistment and physical examination.

Enlistments are for two or three years and men enlisting before next October 6 will be eligible for benefits of the G. I. bill of rights, which includes three or more years of education in any accredited school for which they qualify.

Letter From Washington

THE ANNUAL DINNER meeting of the Oregon Society of Washington, D. C., was held February 5. It is customary to have these annual meetings on or near February 14, the date on which Oregon was admitted to the union. Some 300 or more former Oregon residents are now living in Washington. The organization now known as the Oregon Society was formed 15 years ago. Backbone of the organization and the one who really keeps it going is Miss Pheme Miller, daughter of the noted Oregon poet, Joaquin Miller.

During the past two years, Lyle Watts, chief forester, has served as president. He is loyal to Oregon having served in Portland as district forester for many years, prior to being elevated to the position of chief of the forest service here. Ben Fisher, former Coos Bay attorney, was one of the organizers of the society and continues active.

At the dinner last week, Hugh Rosson, director of veterans' affairs for the State of Oregon, was principal speaker. Short talks were made by all of the members of the Oregon delegation in congress. All four representatives and both senators were present with their wives.

Officers elected for the coming year were: Miss Pheme Miller, president; Carlton Savage, who has been with the state department for 15 years and is now assistant to the secretary, was named vice president. Savage is from Salem, and was president of the University of Oregon student body during his college days. Miss Ethel Johnson, former secretary to Congressman Angell, was named secretary and Miss Virginia Nichols, treasurer.

THE CASE SUBSTITUTE for the Labor Fact Finding Bill, which I mentioned in my last letter, brought forth the most violent opposition from organized labor. I have received a great many telegrams from labor union heads in my district who regard the bill as a piece of anti-labor legislation.

There were some bad spots in the bill as originally introduced but these were cleaned up by amendments on the floor. I do not believe the bill as amended is anti-labor. In fact I believe that if and when legislation embodying the principles of this bill is passed it will be beneficial to the rank and file of the members of labor unions. In replying by letter to the wires received from labor leaders, I said in part as follows:

"The principal value of the bill and the reason why I believe such legislation should in fact be favored by organized labor members is that it will help to protect them from loss of work and income caused by hastily called, hot-headed and unauthorized strikes. The pending bill provides for orderly conciliation and mediation steps and for voluntary arbitration. Had such a bill been passed previously, much work stoppage in the past could have been prevented, and more such loss in the future can be avoided, if machinery is established to help

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Sock and Shirt Remedy Sought

Washington, Feb. 13 — (U.P.)—The government is considering a plan to ease the stocking and shirt shortage by forcing manufacturers to sell them promptly. The civilian production administration, it was learned, is drawing up an order which would limit manufacturers' inventories to a 30-day supply of suits, shirts, trousers, shorts and rayon and nylon hose. Other items may be added to the list later.

KIDS WIN REDUCTION IN PRICE OF MOVIES

Verona, Ore., Feb. 13 — (U.P.)—Another strike was settled today, when high school students, striking against the Joy theater for lower admissions, agreed today to a compromise price of 40 cents.

The students began picketing the theater Jan. 24, forcing its closing, when the theater owners

refused to lower admission prices for high school students from 50 to 35 cents.
