

FAR WEST SHOWS POPULATION GAIN IN LAST 4 YEARS

Census Bureau Estimates
Total Figure Now 139-
500,000 With Servicemen

Washington, Feb. 13—(U.P.)—The census bureau estimated today that the population of the United States was about 139,500,000 on last July 1, including members of the armed forces.

On that date, the civilian population was estimated at 127,409,297, while a total of 12,228,109 persons had been taken in to the armed forces and not yet returned to civilian life.

On April 1, 1940, population of the United States was 131,669,275.

About 4,500,000 members of the armed forces were in the United States on last July 1, the census bureau estimated, and they accounted for large population increases shown by southern and western states, where a majority of military installations are located.

Far West Gains
The far west was the only section of the country which recorded an increase in the civilian population between 1940 and 1945. Most of the rise was in California, Washington, Oregon and Arizona.

For most states, contributions of men and women to the armed forces exceeded their natural population increase—the excess of births over deaths. Nine states, however, recorded a natural population increase greater than their contributions to the armed forces.

They were North and South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico and Utah.

ELEANOR ATTACKS REDS IN UNO TALK

London, Feb. 13—(U.P.)—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt drew a great ovation from the UNO general assembly tonight when she denounced Russian attempts to force repatriation of European war refugees as a blow at "human rights and human freedom."

Mrs. Roosevelt injected herself into the revived UNO debate on refugees to oppose a last-minute Soviet move which, in effect, would shift responsibility for the refugee problem from the UNO to the individual nations concerned.

She received the biggest round of applause accorded any delegate so far with her attack on the Russian maneuver.

Mrs. Roosevelt particularly criticized Soviet Andrei I. Vishinsky for raising the argument that refugee camps were being staffed with German personnel.

She spoke extemporaneously in answer to a speech by Vishinsky in which the Soviet delegate demanded UNO action to eliminate "fascist and hostile propaganda" in European refugee camps.

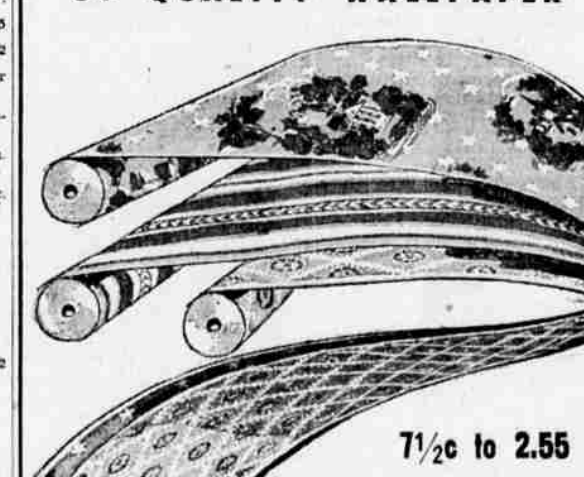

SEN. MORSE DIGS REPUBLICANS AT LINCOLN BANQUET

Boise, Ida., Feb. 13—(U.P.)—The republican party today stood challenged to prove that its program was one of interest to the common man and that it was not an anti-labor organization.

Sen. Wayne L. Morse, R., Ore., speaker at last night's Idaho Lincoln Day banquet here, failed to denounce the new deal, almost a tradition at past republican performances, but by inference denounced the republican party for lack of progressiveness.

In addition to a demand that the GOP back up the common man and march with labor, Morse asked the republicans to support the United Nations organization and eliminate economic warfare in trade relations.

What To Do
He said the republican party had a chance to be returned to a position of trust and power providing:

"The republican party offers itself as the party of no special group; if it will offer itself as a party that believes representative government should function in the interest of the common men and women of America rather than to entrench the interests of just a privileged few; if it will offer itself as a party that believes America must fulfill her part in keeping faith with the spirit and intent of the new emancipation proclamation,

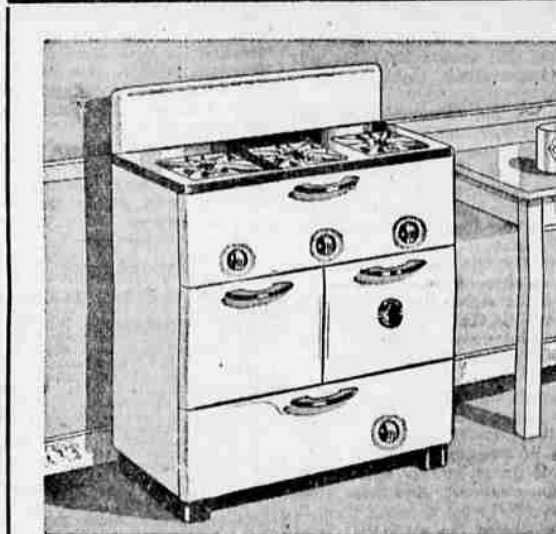
