TUCKER VICTIM OF MASSACRE IN WAKE ISLE, WORD

An official report from the naval department to Medford relatives of Earl E. Tucker states that he was one of 98 men massacred by the Japanese on Wake Island Oct. 7, 1943. Tucker, 50 years old at the time of his death, left his home in Gold Hill July 7, 1941, for Wake Island, having been employed there by the Morris-Knutson Construction company. Relatives heard from him last in November, 1941, and hear nothing further, directly or indirectly, until the communication from the navy arrived this week.

Tucker was born at Wood Lake, Neb., Feb. 27, 1893. He crossed the plains in a covered wagon with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward H. Tucker, who settled in the Rogue River valley near Medford in 1896. He spent his entire life in this vicinity until leaving in 1941.

He leaves three sons, Lowell E., Gold Hill; Pvt. Virgil H., USMC; and Pfc. Robert K., now of Macdonel, Calif.; one daughter, Mrs. Manard Gardner of Klamath Falls; his mother, Mrs. E. H. Tucker, route 2, Medford, and two sisters, Mrs. Ethel Morris of Central Point and Mrs. Mildred Henry, Medford.

GOLD MINES NEED GOVERNMENT AID

Washington, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—Witnesses told the house war claims committee today that unless the government provides financial help to rehabilitate war-closed gold mines, a large percentage of gold production in the United States will be lost.

Officials of western states and gold mining companies urged the committee to approve a bill to authorize the government to pay claims for losses resulting from a 1942 federal order which closed gold mines during the war.

Yankees Injured In India Rioting

Calcutta, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—U. S. army headquarters announced today that 19 American soldiers have been hospitalized from injuries suffered when a mob stoned an American truck convoy last night during rioting which has killed 32 and wounded 300.

The army convoy was carrying 1,000 American soldiers to a staging area for redeployment to the United States when nationalist rioters attacked it with rocks near Calcutta. Return of the injured men to their homes will be delayed.

Berliners Increase In Height, Weight Under Occupation

Berlin (U.P.)—Residents of bombed-out Berlin have increased in height and weight under Allied occupation, a military government nutritional survey has disclosed.

Some women have reached 103 per cent of the internationally accepted height and weight standards while all women, especially younger ones, have improved in health during the last three months.

Men between 18 and 39 have not fared as well, but still register 96 per cent of the accepted standard. Males of other ages have improved in health.

Children of both sexes under 10 receive more food than is needed to maintain minimum health requirements, the survey showed.
