

Hats As Zany In 1890 As Today Copies Of Old Magazines Reveal

Women's hats were just as zany in 1890 as they are in the spring of 1946, and copies of "The Delineator," a journal of "fashion, culture and fine arts" published years ago by the Butterick company of London and New York, prove it. Copies of this magazine, along with 1868, 1871 and 1880 publications of the monthly magazine, "Demorest's" were uncovered recently during remodeling of the home of Earl Bradfish, 110 Ashland avenue.

The October, 1891, issue of The Delineator includes everything for feminine readers from baby lullabies and directions for fancy work to the social code of mourning, to say nothing of pages of advertisements.

Filling a half page of the issue is an advertisement of an "electropoise," a "simple and easily applied home treatment" which augments vitality by "supplementing the work of the lungs."

Directions to change the "faded, wrinkled woman" into one that is fresh and wholesome are given in an article titled "nerves." "The most invidious foe to a fresh face is insomnia," the article says, and continues with directions for eating, sleeping and living in general.

Fashion plays a very important part in the publications, with considerable space contributed to the extreme styles of the 1870's. Gowns with huge sleeves and collars and flowing skirts, ha.. of great size featuring plumes, birds, flowers and yards of ribbon are pictured. Illustrations of the latest fashions are made so to be easily copied by the readers.

In an item titled "The Womanly Woman," the writer warns lady readers against appearing anything but feminine in appearance. "Knowing that the world has an unwise but very prevalent habit of judging a woman by the dress she wears, and that she who affects a masculine style of raiment is almost certain to lose a portion of that tender respect with which all women should be regarded, she invariably arrays herself in a garb that is strictly feminine."

"Therefore, she avoids the display of a penchant for 'manish' gowns and hats, nor does she tramp through life attracting the attention of the opposite sex with her unwomanly bearing."

Books noted in April, 1891, included "Over the Tea-Cups," by Oliver Wendell Holmes; "Hindu Literature," prepared by Elizabeth A. Reed; and others written by Rudyard Kipling, Bret Harte and Lewis Carroll, author of "Alice in Wonderland."

In speaking of a book titled "The Round Trip from the Hub to the Golden Gate," written by Susie S. Clark, the Delineator states that the "conspicuous lack of dignity in the title, and similar lack in the signature of its author, does not predispose a stranger in favor of its contents."

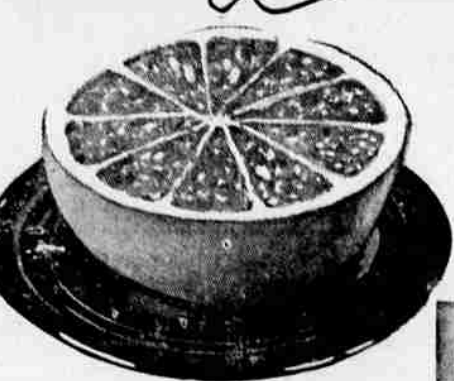

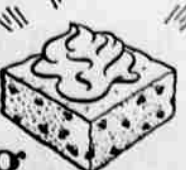
