

G. P. RESTAURANT FIGHTS ATTEMPT AT UNIONIZATION

Grants Pass, Feb. 14—Pickets appeared before Tracy's Steak House Wednesday in a move to secure a union agreement between the restaurant Local No. 329, Restaurant Employees and Bartenders, AFL.

The action culminated sever-

al months of discussions between Jim Tracy, owner of the restaurant, and Mrs. Marjorie Barnes of Medford, secretary of the local and member of the Central Labor Council.

The restaurant was declared "unfair" to the local Tuesday night when Tracy ignored a letter from Charles W. Clary of Medford, secretary of the Central Labor Council, asking Tracy to appear before the council that night to show cause why he should not be placed on the unfair list.

The union on January 9 won an agreement from the Redwoods coffee shop after picketing that restaurant for three weeks.

Employees at Tracy's, in an election held last month, voted 13-0 against joining the union according to W. W. Baldersee, attorney, who with George McCormick, secretary of the Elks, conducted the voting. According to a transcript of the proceedings, the employees told Baldersee and McCormick that they had never been coerced or persecuted in their vote by either Tracy or by the union.

MORSE TO FIGHT FILIBUSTER AND COMMITTEE VETO

Portland, Ore., Feb. 14—(U.P.) Senator Wayne Morse, R., Ore., today declared he would fight to abolish filibustering and proposed to change the "ancient and archaic" rules of the senate so that a "willful minority" could not prevent a majority from acting.

Morse, who stopped here briefly en route from Vale, Ore., to Corvallis and Eugene where he was scheduled to speak, said filibustering threatened the "very foundation" of American government, which is "based solidly on the theory of majority rule and of government built and directed by the voice of the majority."

Committee Veto Hit

He said his fight against filibustering was not based primarily upon consideration of the fair employment bill but on the "fundamental proposition that the majority of the senate should not be prevented from considering it by a small minority bulwarked behind archaic rules."

Morse also attacked a senate rule that allowed a committee chairman to kill a measure before his committee by refusing to offer it for consideration. He advocated that the rule governing committee procedure be changed so any measure before the committee could be considered after a majority vote by the group. Morse also said he favored abolition of the seniority rule under which committee chairmen "grow into their chairmanships by seniority of service on their committee."

Committee chairmen, he declared, should be elected by the committee.

"GLASS EYE'S" PENALTY UPHELD BY COMMANDER

Yokohama, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—Lt. Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger, eighth army commander, today approved a life imprisonment sentence for Tatsuo "Little Glass Eye" Tsuchiya, the first Japanese war criminal to be tried in the Japanese homeland. Tsuchiya was found guilty Dec. 27 on general charges of committing cruel and inhuman atrocities against war prisoners at the Mitsuishima camp.
