Washington, Feb. 15—(U.P.)—The army air forces will discharge approximately 500,000 officers and enlisted men and women within the next 4½ months, which will leave an air force of approximately 400,000 men next July 1, the war department announced today.

Of those to be discharged, approximately 185,000 were in the United States on February 1.

Experiment Bomb Will Be Dropped From Navy Plane

San Diego, Feb. 15—(U.P.)—The atomic bomb which will be used in the navy's May experiment will be dropped from a naval fighter plane flying from the 28,000-ton aircraft carrier Shangri-La, the San Diego Journal said today in a copyrighted article.

The Journal said the Shangri-La has been conducting experiments up and down the coast for more than a month. The fighter will be a Grumman F6F, with specially constructed bombing equipment, the Journal said.

The Journal said it also learned that the control ship El Dorado will be used as the command vessel for the atomic bomb tests in the Marshall Islands.
