ROOSEVELT P.T.A. SPONSORS FORUM ON SCHOOL NEEDS

Approximately 100 parents and teachers attended the forum meeting of the Roosevelt P.T.A. at the school Thursday night when extensive discussion of school improvement plans was heard. Mrs. Ivan Davies, president of Junior High P.T.A., reported briefly on a recent meeting of her group where school needs were discussed. She pointed out that the purpose of P.T.A. is to cooperate with the school superintendent, board and teachers, and not to criticize.

Mrs. J. W. Barnard, P.T.A. president, who presided, introduced Otto Frohnmayer who acted as moderator. The latter called on Frank Bash, Dr. C. G. VanValzah, K. G. Denman and Dr. A. E. Merkel who made up the panel.

Frohnmayer told of a state statute prohibiting spending in excess of six per cent of assessed valuation, which limits bond issues. Bash suggested a long-term view in school improvement, including latest type lighting, heating and construction phases. VanValzah urged no let-down in teaching standards with better salaries, sick leave and pension provisions.

Denman declared that broken homes resulting from war conditions have put more responsibility on teachers and neighborhood groups in assisting children to develop moral values and good citizenship. He also suggested an expanded physical development program for the schools to include greater numbers.

Dr. Merkel told what could be done toward a more thorough regular physical examination and remarked that while the hot lunch program was most beneficial to the children it could be improved by employing a dietitian who could plan balanced school lunches.

During the social hour there was further discussion among members present, opinions voiced including advocacy of more discussion groups to consider school problems, promotion of interest in a bond issue for school improvement and actively interested school board members.

Miss Mabel Nansen, in the absence of Mrs. Hamilton who was ill, directed the Roosevelt glee club in several numbers. Hostesses were mothers from the rooms of Mrs. Maxwell and Mrs. Hill.

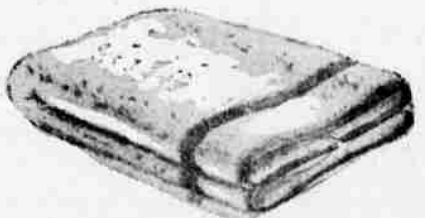
