Trio To Appear Tuesday Evening For Association

A musical ensemble that offers an unusual degree of interest is the Le Roy-Foster-Scholz trio which will be heard in Medford Tuesday evening at the high school auditorium at 8:15 p. m. Combining cello, flute and piano played by three

distinguished artists, the trio exploits a rich and much neglected literature according to music critics.

Rene Le Roy, rated as a distinctive musician as well as a flutist, has devoted a lifetime of study to the literature for his instrument and has brought to light many works for flute, cello and piano heretofore completely unknown. Dedicated to giving these forgotten masterpieces a hearing, he organized the trio with Janos Scholz, considered one of the outstanding solo cellists of our time, and Sidney Foster, who since his debut with the New York Philharmonic Symphony in 1941 has carved a place for himself among the front ranking virtuosi of the day.

The program to be given here is divided between solo and ensemble numbers. Opening number will be Boieldieu's "Trio in D major, Opus 5" played by the ensemble and will be followed by "Sonata in A major, No. 3", Beethoven, played by Scholz and Foster. "Andante and Allegro from Sonata in G major" by Handel and "Fantasie for Flute and Piano" by Faure will be presented by Le Roy and Foster. Closing the first group of numbers will be Debussy's "La Boite a Joujoux" played by the ensemble.

"Nocturne in F major" by Chopin, "Polonaise in A flat major" also by Chopin and "Sonata No. 3" by Prokofiev will be presented by Foster and the program will close with "Suite de Panama" by Silveira, presented by the ensemble.

Next concert will be Feb. 25 when the Markova and Dolin ballet troupe appears at the auditorium.
