Basketball Teams Await Call For National Titular Games in March

New York, Feb. 18.—(U.P.)—Three newly crowned sectional champions and a flock of top-ranking independent quintets led the nation's basketball parade today and awaited only the call to the big March tournaments to make their bids for national titular honors.
North Carolina, Dartmouth and California clinched their respective league titles during the week-end to stake their claims for tournament bids.
Among the independents, New York University, West Virginia, Syracuse, Muhlenberg, Bowling Green and Nevada continued to build up impressive records and stay in the running for national consideration.
North Carolina Tarheels defeated Duke, 55 to 44, to finish their Southern conference schedule with 13 victories and one loss. The busy Tarheels had an overall record of 24 victories in 26 games to stamp themselves the leading team in the south. Duke is the only collegiate team that has beaten North Carolina this season.
Dartmouth captured its seventh eastern Ivy league championship in eight years by downing Columbia, 47 to 27. It was the 11th straight triumph for the Indians who wound up with a league record of seven triumphs against a lone defeat. Dartmouth's record for the season was 13 victories and three defeats.
Seattle, Feb. 18.—(U.P.)—The Matheny-Bacon All-Stars of Seattle nipped the San Francisco Bards Dandies 44 to 43 in a closely-fought American Basketball league game here last night.

Oregon State, Vandals In Deadlock for Top Honors

University of Idaho and Oregon State basketball squads prepared for a knock-down drag-out stretch battle for the Pacific Coast conference northern division cage title today while California, newly-crowned southern division champs, prepared for the conference playoffs March 8-9.

While Cal was clinching the southern division diadem with a brace of victories over Stanford, 42 to 31 and 53 to 37, Oregon State defeated Washington State twice, 63 to 43 and 54 to 33, and Idaho took two close decisions from University of Washington, 40 to 38 and 51 to 48, to maintain their tie for the division lead over the week-end.

The Vandals and the Beavers each have a record of nine victories against four defeats. Each has three remaining games to be played. Idaho is idle this week-end, while the Beavers meet fourth-place Washington in two games.
In the only other week-end conference games, University of Southern California divided a pair with University of California at Los Angeles, losing 45 to 35 Friday and taking the long end 60 to 43 Saturday.

Nokrashy's communique came as crowds of students paraded the streets shouting "To hell with England."

Military Control of Atom Bomb Described

Chicago, Feb. 18.—(U.P.)—World War III will come in 10 to 15 years unless atomic energy is removed from military control, Dr. Harold C. Urey, who directed part of the research on the atom bomb, said today.
Urey, a Nobel prize winner from the University of Chicago, declared:
"The desperate time regarding atomic energy will be in about

five years. By that time, however, it will be impossible to stop the atomic armament race which already has begun in the United States."
