GRANITE CRUSHER AT ROGUE RIVER WAITS MACHINERY

Rogue River, Feb. 18—Completion of the Bristol Silica company granite crushing plant on Blackwell hill awaits the arrival of electrical equipment, manufacture and delivery of which has been held up by strikes, F. I. Bristol, owner of the local firm said Friday.

The plant, which will crush granite for poultry grit, will have a capacity of 120 tons a day.

Bristol has operated the silica crusher here since 1938 and reports a steadily increasing business. He produces both silica and standard granite grit for Oregon, Washington and Idaho markets and during the war supplied most of the gasoline plants east of the Mississippi with silica for use in their gasoline cracking process.

Silica or quartz crystals, the white particles of granite, are found in pure deposits where nature has worn away and segregated the softer parts. Deposits of this sort are located at Miller's Gulch where the Bristol company is quarrying. Standard granite is being taken from Blackwell hill.

Crushing facilities here are of 40 ton capacity. Ten men are employed by the company at the present. Granite from the Blackwell hill plant will continue to be hauled to Rogue River for final screening and shipment.

AIR BASE SEARCH UNIT SHIFTED TO PORTLAND FIELD

Personnel of the Medford army air base search and rescue unit will move this week to the Portland air base. It was stated at the base this morning that the loss of men through discharges from service had made it impractical to keep the unit in operation.

Major Frank Rasor, commanding officer of the unit, is to go to McCord Field, Tacoma, where he will take over command of the unit there, but the remaining seven officers and 14 enlisted men will report at the Portland field, it was said.

Since activation early in December, the unit has worked on three cases, it was reported, all three being navy planes reported lost in southern Oregon, one thought to have been forced down somewhere north of Crater Lake and the other two near Bly. Search parties were unable to locate any of the planes due to heavy snow and exceedingly rough terrain in the areas, it was stated. In the future, search and rescue for planes lost in this area will be carried on from the Portland base.
