

COMING SPEAKER IS AUTHORITY ON PACIFIC PHASES

Considered one of the best informed men in the United States concerning the probable development of America's Pacific outposts, Hawthorne Daniel will be guest speaker for the meeting of the Rogue River Valley Knife and Fork club Friday, Feb. 22. Daniel will speak at the Roosevelt school auditorium at 8 p. m.

Daniel, who has just recently completed a globe-circling trip in the interests of the clubs and of his publishers, is a former member of the Naval Academy and was a naval officer during the first World War. An old injury which was received in a football game made it necessary for him to resign from active service. However, as a consequence, many of the men who are now admirals in the service were his Annapolis classmates and they knew each other well.

Among the leading figures that he talked with on this trip were General MacArthur, Admiral Nimitz, Lord Louis Mountbatten, General Marshall and other generals by the score. According to Mr. Daniel he not only visited with the brass hats but he met many lesser lights.

Rev. Beasom will present the report of a survey by Lutheran heads which recently was carried on in Europe. Lutheran churches throughout the country have been challenged with the task of raising \$10,000,000 in the coming biennium.

During the emergencies created by war, funds raised by Lutherans carried on assistance to Christians throughout the world. Through Lutheran World Action recreation and housing centers were maintained for men and women in service, the services of the church were brought to uprooted peoples of defense areas, emergency welfare and assistance were provided, financial aid was given to the American Bible Society, as well as aid to prisoners of war in allied and enemy camps.

San Francisco, Feb. 19.—(U.P.) The Federal Bureau of Investigation today began an inquiry in the deaths of two San Francisco teen-aged merchant seamen during an equator-crossing "shell-back" initiation aboard the freighter S.S. Frederick Galbraith.

The FBI and war shipping administration entered the case at the request of the families of the youths, Leroy Robert Bragg, 14, and Stanford Fluitt, 16.

Shipmates said the youthful sailors died after being forced to swallow a mixture of a pound and one-half of saltpeter and a gallon of water in the traditional line-crossing ceremony.

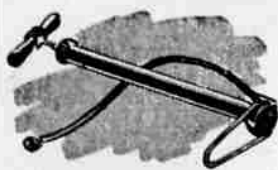

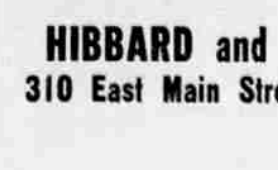
