Terry Moore Named Cardinal Captain Brings Surprise To Men Of Baseball

New York, Feb. 19—(U.P.)—Baseball men seemed a little surprised today that Manager Eddie Dyer of the St. Louis Cardinals named 34-year-old Terry Moore as team captain—which must surprise both Dyer and Moore.

For the plain fact of the matter is that Dyer has believed as gospel all along that Moore would be his outfield pivot man when the Cards go out in April to start winning back that National league flag from the Chicago Cubs.

Dyer made no bones about this during the recent major league meetings when he was discussing 1946 prospects. What's more, he received a solid second from owner Sam Breadon.

"Our outfield certainly is no problem," Dyer explained. "Moore will be back."

Just like that the Texas man solved the situation. And, when somebody wanted to know whether Moore wasn't getting just a bit too decrepit, Eddie explained:

"Sure, Terry soon will be 34 but he's just as fast as ever, he's smart, and he'll cover as much ground as any of them. On top of that, Moore is just about the greatest team player in the majors today."

International Baseball Controversy Between Brooklyn and Mexico League

New York, Feb. 19—(U.P.)—An international baseball controversy developed today between Branch Rickey of Brooklyn and Bernardo Pasquel of Mexico City concerning the sudden epidemic of "home sickness" which has gripped the big league's Latin section.

Specifically, the bone of contention is Pasquel's north-of-the-border raids on the New York Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers which has netted four unhappy Latins in the past 24 hours.
