

SALVATION ARMY WILL HEAR NOTED PENAL AUTHORITY

Lt. Col. Agnes McKernan, former director of the Women's Prison Bureau of the Salvation Army in New York city, will speak at the Salvation Army, 236 N. Bartlett street, Thursday at 7:30 p. m.

A native of Ireland, Lt. Col. McKernan, who has worked

with women prison inmates in the United States since 1925, will tell of her work in these institutions.

Prior to that time, Lt. Col. McKernan's work with the Salvation Army took her through-out the British Isles, and to France during World War I. In 1935 Secretary of State Cordell Hull appointed her a delegate to the penal congress in Berlin.

Speaking of women paroled under her care, Lt. Col. McKernan said that from 80 to 90 per cent make good. "We get them clothes, find jobs and homes for them, straighten out their love tangles, sometimes cure their bodies, and for some cure their souls," she said. "They come from all classes of society and include a percentage of high school and college graduates," she added.

Col. McKernan's talks and addresses sparkle with her Irish wit and are filled with an abundance of human interest stories concerning women and girls, inside and outside corre-

METE BUILDING PUMICE GARAGE

In Oregon and Clark county, Washington, there are 30 participating hospitals. Sacred Heart hospital is the local member hospital.

Butter Famine to Continue 2 Years

San Francisco, Feb. 19.—(U.P.) Richard J. Werner, San Francisco, manager of the California Dairy Advisory board, said today there was no indication of relief from the butter famine for at least two years.

"California will continue to divert a large share of dairy material to milk and cream rather than put it on the butter market," Werner said at a meeting of 500 delegates to the Pacific States Butter, Eggs, Cheese and Poultry association conference.

Big Cougar Killed By Trail Resident

Trail, Feb. 19.—Recent killing six miles north of here of a 200-pound cougar measuring eight feet in length is reported by L. W. Oliver who brought the animal down with a 30-30 rifle and without the aid of dogs. The animal was shot near the home of Oliver's father, E. H. Oliver. Young Oliver was discharged about two months ago after four years service in the army. He saw duty in Alaska and Italy.

SUGAR PRICE HIKE MUST WAIT SALE OF STOCK ON HAND

Retailers of sugar were warned today by a wholesale grocer and the OPA price clerk for this district that if they raise the price of any item of sugar before the supplies of that particular item on hand Feb. 9 is exhausted, this constitutes a violation of the OPA order granting the sugar increase as of Feb. 16.

S. A. Gibbs, manager of the Mason Ehrman company here, stated that some retailers have already raised the price of sugar, and since it is considered unlikely they had already exhausted their Feb. 9 inventory supplies, this was in violation of the order. The order reads: "Special rules for figuring ceiling prices for sugar after Feb. 9. At the close of business on Feb. 9, 1946, you must determine the number of pounds of each item of sugar that you own at that time. You must make and keep an inventory at your place of business. After that date you must continue to sell each item of sugar at no more than the ceiling price you had in effect on Feb. 9 until you have sold an amount equal to your Feb. 9 inventory of the item. When you have sold that amount, you shall re-figure your ceiling price for the item in accordance with the rules in Section 6."

The OPA price clerk corroborated Mr. Gibbs' statement. Housewives were advised today by OPA to retain in their possession War Ration Book 4, now used only to obtain sugar.

Although the currently valid sugar stamp 39 is the last stamp in War Ration Book 4 that is specifically labeled for purchases of sugar, spare stamps in that book will be designated as sugar stamps from time to time. For this reason, War Ration Book 4 should be retained even after Sugar Stamp 39 has been used, OPA emphasized.

Sugar Stamp 40 was used for the 1944 home canning program, OPA explained.
