Jackson County Sheriff's posse will attend the Portland Rose Festival in a body and will take part in the drills, it was decided at a meeting of the Sheriff's posse held Monday night. Reservations for horse pullmans are being made to transport the mounts to Portland.

Past Captain Gene Thomas gave a report on the hay fund and Dr. J. C. Hayes reported that arrangements for the St. Patrick's Day "Whing-Ding" for posse members and their wives and for the Ladies Auxiliary and husbands were progressing satisfactorily and that arrangements have been made with Chalkers Motel to handle 130 persons for the occasion. Lt. Tony Bontano reported on conditions at the stables and said plans for new posse headquarters are progressing.

Dr. Charles Lemery, chairman of the uniform committee, said he is having several uniforms made up as samples. He also said 60 Stetson western hats have been ordered.
C. CITY STEPS DOWN
IN BUILDING DEAL

Enabling Medford post 15 of the American Legion to continue negotiations with the Federal Works Administration for the Riverside USO building, the city council at its meeting last night passed a resolution waiving city priority on the structure. The action followed the post's signification by letter to Mayor C. A. Meeker, that the organization did not intend to institute proceedings in conflict with the council's plan for a community center. Also according to Meeker, the post has offered the federal agency a price higher than that which can be considered by the city.

If the post is unable to acquire the building, priority on it will revert back to the city, it was pointed out.
