

ROSSES WELCOME THIRD SON HOME FROM NAVY DUTY

Third son of Mr. and Mrs. William H. Ross to return from the service, S1/c Calvin A. Ross, arrived at the family home, 1030 Henry street in Ashland, Sunday. Ross was honorably discharged from the navy at Shoemaker, Calif., after three years service, 22 months of which were spent in the Asiatic Pacific theater and Alaska. He served as a member of an armed guard on a merchant ship.

Clifford E. Ross was second of the three sons to return home when he was discharged early in January at Ft. Lewis, Wash., after five years, three months with the army infantry and coast artillery. A private first class, he spent seven months in the Asiatic-Pacific theater. Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Ross are residing at the home of his parents at present.

First of the sons to be honorably discharged from the service was Charles Irvin Ross, former motor machinist's mate, second class, who was released in September at Boston, Mass. The former navyman, who is residing with his wife at their home at 610 Beach street in Ashland, served 21 months in the Pacific, stationed at a P. T. base.

A fourth son who served in the armed forces, Pfc. Dale Ross, was lost in action on Guadalcanal.

MEASLES SHOW SLIGHT DECLINE

Measles continues to be the most prevalent of the communicable diseases, with 69 new cases listed in the county during the week ending Feb. 15. This, however, represents a decline from the previous week when almost 100 cases were listed.

Thirty-seven of the 69 cases were reported from Medford and 14 from Gold Hill. Lone Pine district reported 8, Evans Valley four and Griffin Creek, Central Point and Phoenix each listed one case. Camp White reported three cases.

Chickenpox was next on the list in points of numbers, with a total of 17 cases reported. Eleven were listed from Gold

Hill, four from Eagle Point and one each from Medford and Griffin Creek.

Also reported were one case of epidemic meningitis in Ashland, one case of influenza, also in Ashland, one of rheumatic fever, Medford, one case of undulant fever, Oak Grove, one case of malaria at Camp White and one case of amoebic dysentery, Medford.
