Danish Teacher's Indiscretion Is Political Issue

Copenhagen, Feb. 21—U.P.—The case of the Danish school-ma'am who demanded leave of absence to have a baby out of wedlock became a political issue today after Premier Knud Kristensen told an election rally that

he thought the lady was setting a bad precedent for other unmarried women.

Kristensen objected particularly to the casual attitude of the schoolteacher, Miss Inger Merete Nordentoft, toward the whole affair.

The 46-year-old Miss Norden-

toft is a communist member of the Riksdag, in addition to her school work, and she expects her baby sometime in April. Meantime, she is on maternity leave from both jobs.

Kristensen, who has been attacking the communist party in his present election tour, said he thought Miss Nordentoft was

all wrong in defending the right of unmarried women to have children.

APPLE PANCAKES—To 2 cups of prepared pancake flour, add 2 eggs and 1 1/4 cups milk beaten together. Blend well. Stir in 1 cup finely chopped apples and 2 tablespoons melted shortening. Drop by tablespoonfuls onto greased griddle or frying pan. Bake until bubbles break; turn and bake until golden brown. Wrap each pancake around a well-cooked sausage link. Serve hot with warm syrup. Serves 6.

SAUTEED KIDNEYS—Skin, split in half lengthwise, and remove white tubes and tissues from 6 to 12 veal or lamb kidneys. Wash thoroughly. Cut into thin slices and cover with flour, salt and pepper. Sauté in drippings about 3 minutes or until browned. Add 1 cup hot water and cook about 5 minutes, or until thickened, stirring constantly. Serve hot. Serves 6.

START THE DAY RIGHT!

Baked Winter Pears
Broiled Lamb Chops and Hashed Brown Potatoes
Toasted English Muffin
Coffee or Milk

HASHED BROWN POTATOES—Melt 3 tablespoons shortening in a heavy frying pan; add 3 cups chopped or finely cut cooked potatoes, heaping them toward the center and away from the edges of the pan; season to taste. Cover with a lid or heavy plate; press down so that cover is right on top of the potatoes. Place a box of salt or rock on top to give pressure. Cook slowly and without turning for 15 to 20 minutes, or until crusty brown. Turn out onto a warm plate. Cut into 4 or 6 pie-shaped wedges to serve.
