LAKE O' WOODS ROAD TOPIC OF PORTLAND MEET

William Perry, representing the Jackson county court, and Frank J. Newman, Chamber of Commerce representative, will attend a meeting with state highway officials in Portland Feb. 26 regarding improvement of the Lake O' Woods road, it was learned today. They will be joined by Wally Hector of the Klamath County court and Johnny Huston and Charlie Stark of the Klamath Falls Chamber of Commerce. Also to attend the meeting are Jack Dutcher of Klamath Falls, and Tom Neeley, Medford, partners in the lake resort.

It is understood that one proposal to the highway commission will be that the Fish Lake road north of Lake O' Woods to the Jackson county line be made a state secondary highway and it is also expected that the commission will be asked to improve the west side upper lake state secondary highway, a part of the route from Klamath Falls to the lake.

The road concerned runs from the mountain north of the lake and connects with a secondary road in Jackson county, a distance of about eight miles. The Dead Indian road from the junction of highway 236 and around the west side of the lake is a county road and would also be improved.

ROGUE RIVER VFW BUYS HOME SITE

Rogue River, Feb. 22.—Purchase by the local VFW post of a lot at the corner of Main and Pine streets on which will be erected a chapter house is announced by Col. Ted Hopkins, post commander.

Bodies Of Seventh Century Saxons Found Near London

Lenham, Eng. (U.P.) — Workmen remodeling a building dating back to the late 14th or early 15th century found three skeletons which archaeologists believed were those of Saxons of the seventh century.

Experts said the skeletons were those of three adults—two men of average height and build, and a woman of smaller stature. The woman's bones were lying across those of one of the men as though she had been embracing him. One skeleton had perfect teeth.

Theory of Murders
British archaeologists were puzzled by the circumstances of the skeletons indicated by the find in this Kentish village 49 miles from London. Because of the proximity of the skeletons, some townsfolk suggested they indicated a centuries-old triple murder. But authorities said the evidence was too skimpy to bear out the theory with any degree of certainty.

The skeletons were found in the ancient "clock house" of Lenham, nearby were unearthed many coins, mostly Georgian, and a small prayer book dated 1638.

Archaeologists said both men had been buried with their hands, and that one had a fairly well preserved iron sword. The other had a small knife attached to the waist, and what appeared to be a spear.

The skeleton of the woman was lying beside a bronze buckle and number of bronze studs which evidently were fittings for a belt. She had no brooches or beads such as usually are found in Anglo-Saxon burials.

Believed Christians
Experts said the lack of ornaments at the scene of the woman's skeleton and the fact that all the bodies were buried facing east, indicated that remains were those of Christians.

They said there were no clues to show how or where they died.

The fact that the area in which the skeletons were found has been built over with homes and factories virtually ruled out further investigation by the archaeologists.

The skeletons were found only a few inches below the foundations of the medieval house. A footpath ran nearby.

R. H. Goodsall, owner of the house under which the skeletons were found, is a member of the Kent Archaeological Society. He offered the findings to the Maidstone, Kent, museum.

San Francisco, Feb. 22.—(U.P.)—Pfc. Norman A. Sorger, 23, Canfield, N. J., was found dead in his bunk when the Marine wave docked here yesterday from Nagoya, Japan, and apparently committed suicide by taking poison, the army announced today. Other soldiers said he had been despondent about a speech impediment.

ENGRAVES 60,000 MEDALS

Chicago — (U.P.) — The Chicago Quartermaster Depot was designated on Aug. 1, 1943, as the supply depot for medals and awards for the 5th, 6th, and 7th service commands, and since that date has had 60,000 medals engraved and 115,000 enameled.

REDS GIVEN TASTE OF OWN MEDICINE

Tokyo, Feb. 22 — (U.P.) — Lt. Gen. John R. Hodge has refused permission for Soviet Tass News Agency correspondents to visit the American occupation zone in Korea until U. S. correspondents are allowed in the Russian zone. It was learned today.

Hodge is commander of U. S. occupation forces in southern Korea. The Russians occupy the remainder of the country. Hodge is responsible to Gen. Douglas MacArthur as supreme Allied commander.

3 Manslaughter Charges Facing New Mexico Man

Gallup, N. M., Feb. 22.—(U.P.)—Three manslaughter charges were filed today against Lyle E. Atkinson, 45-year-old San Francisco contractor, as police announced he had confessed to killing three Indian pedestrians and then burying his hit-run auto beneath 15 feet of dirt to hide it.

State Policeman Dave Jackson, who had been investigating the highway triple tragedy since Nov. 11 last year, said Atkinson had signed a confession before leading officers to the buried death car and then reported it stolen.
