Balmy weather, even though a bit windy, and Washington's Birthday remind valley folk that spring is on its way. A few spring flowers are already in bloom, seed catalogs are filling the mail and flower seeds are on the market. However many of the young fry are unable to enjoy the fine weather since the

measles are keeping many at home.

Citizens are watching with mixed emotions as workmen install parking meters along almost all of the downtown streets. The meters, which are to go into operation next Monday, are thought by the city fathers to be the answer to the growing city's parking and traffic problems. Considerable interest is being shown in the new micro-film being installed here by the Southern Oregon Tile company, said to be the first of its kind in the Pacific northwest.

Harry Chipman, sports editor of the Mail Tribune, was named junior first citizen at the second annual Junior Chamber of Commerce Founders' Day banquet. Chipman served as county chairman of the Keep Oregon Green committee last year, was instrumental in bringing the city sports ball league back into operation last summer and revived the Southern Oregon Independent Basketball league this season. Chipman is secretary of the Medford Athletic association. Other awards went to Vic Milnes, Boo Rucker and Dale Stephenson.

Medford's 20-30 club is being re-organized. The club was dormant during the war, since almost all the members were in the service. Clyde Chamberlain is acting president during the reorganization. L. L. Kihn, Lloyd Rupp and Mrs. Ernest Scott were elected officers of a new Central Point Democratic club.

The real estate market continues lively. One of the latest transactions announced was the purchase of the Reliable grocery store by O. C. Richey and John P. Hartsook, who operate the City Meat Market, and Max Millhollin, manager of the Sixth and Bartlett Safeway store. They will take over operation Mar. 4. Building continues to be very heavy, in spite of the difficulties in getting materials. Carpenter's wages have been raised from \$1.35 to \$1.55 an hour under an order issued by the wage adjustment board of the department of labor.

A special election will be held March 19 to determine whether the Medford school district shall be bonded to raise \$500,000 for repairs, additions to present buildings and general school improvement. An ultra-modern auto court is to be constructed

at the north intersection of the old and new highways at Talent by J. C. Falkenhagen and William Schei of Portland. One of the newest business firms in town has advertised that fried chicken will be delivered to any address within the city limits.

B. L. Nutting, E. C. Niles, Lester Harris, Ralph Cook and Mrs. George Maddox are the new officers of the Y.M.C.A. Sheriff's posse members are making plans to attend the Portland Rose Festival in the parades and drills.

Of wide interest is the announcement that the Medford American Legion post has purchased the Riverside USO building and its equipment and furnishings. The building, at the corner of Sixth and Riverside avenue, before the war was used by the Ford agency and was remodeled and equipped for USO use at a cost of about \$147,000. Other local veteran organizations have been invited to participate in the occupancy of the building, which it is thought will be released by the USO some time this spring. Veterans of Foreign Wars are busy working on their building on Front street. At the last meeting, both John T. Frey, air corps veteran, and his wife, Maxine, formerly a Wac, were initiated along with 30 other new recruits.

The engagement of Phyllis Neely to Harlan LeBar, PhMSc, was announced.

Losing their first games of the season to an Oregon high school, Medford high's basketball team bowed 46 to 40 and 39 to 35 to Salem on the Viking court Monday and Tuesday of this week. Medford, winners of the Southern Oregon conference championship, will enter the district four tournament at Ashland next week. The tournament winner will receive a berth in the state championship playoffs at Salem March 13, 14, 15 and 16.

A new independent basketball league has been formed in southern Oregon with teams from Ashland, Phoenix, Central Point and Butte Falls entered. The circuit was formed separately from the Southern Oregon independent loop since the teams were organized after the senior league was in operation.

Paul (Hoosier) Haffard will manage the 1946 Craters, the Medford Athletic association has announced. Haffard is a veteran baseball player.
