PARKING METERS READY FOR COINS MONDAY MORNING

Enforcement of Medford's parking meter ordinance, passed Tuesday night at a meeting of the city council, will begin at 9 a. m. tomorrow, it was announced by City Police Chief Clatous McCredie. Use of the meters, which have been installed in the city business zone during the past two weeks, will be in effect from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. daily except Sundays and legal holidays.

Hour machines are used generally throughout the area but a few two hour meters have been installed. Only pennies or nickels can be used and it was explained that one cent provides clearance for 12 minutes parking; two cents, 24 minutes; three cents, 36 minutes; four cents, 48 minutes; and five cents, 60 minutes. Either 10 pennies or two nickels can be used where two-hour parking is permitted.

Turn Clockwise
McCredie stressed that in operation of the meters, the user should firmly turn the handle-top clockwise until both warning flags drop after insertion of the first coin. The handle should also be turned completely after each additional payment, being sure the indicator goes to the time paid for.

In parking, drivers should bring the front of the radiator even with the meter, McCredie said, and insert coins after determining time needed for parking. Penalty for parking violations is 50c if paid within 24 hours after the citation is received and increases \$1 per day following that period.

No Loading Zones
Loading zones will no longer exist in the metered area, he said, but commercial vehicles will be permitted to load and unload, double-parking if necessary. Other double-parking will not be permitted.

Installation of the meters followed an extensive study of city traffic problems lead by city police and the city council and location of the machines, along with length of parking time, is subject to future change if deemed necessary, it was said.

FINDLEY RESUMES MEDICAL PRACTICE

Major Dwight H. Findley has returned to Medford after three and one-half years in the service. He entered the army as a captain and after one month's training at Santa Ana air base, served two years in the Region Station hospital at Hamilton field. During this time he spent three months at Johns Hopkins Medical school, taking advanced training in internal medicine. At Hamilton field, Dr. Findley was assistant chief of medicine at the hospital.

In December of 1944, he was transferred to the Mediterranean theater in Italy, where he served for six months on the medical staff of the 26th General hospital at Bari, Italy. From there he was transferred to Pisa, Italy, where he served on the surgical staff, later becoming chief of surgery and commanding officer of the hospital. The service there, according to Dr. Findley, was especially heavy, as the hospital covered a large area and was greatly under-staffed with medical officers.

During his stay in Italy, Dr. Findley was in close contact with Col. William H. Fluhrer and Col. Glenn Jackson, both of Medford. He made two trips with Col. Fluhrer, one through Tunis, Tripoli and Malta, and the other through Germany, Belgium and into Paris. He traveled extensively in Italy, Switzerland, Greece, Egypt and Palestine, and now returns to Medford to resume practicing in his former offices at 301 Fluhrer building.

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POLIO FOUNDATION REPRESENTATIVES PAY LOCAL VISIT

On a statewide survey of hospital facilities being made in case a polio epidemic should develop in Oregon, Eugene W. Hall, state representative of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, and Mrs. Aura J. Neely, R. N., of the Oregon State Board of Health, spent Thursday in Medford. The two made their survey here and met at luncheon with the executive board of the Jackson County Public Health association at the home of the president, Mrs. Elwood Hedberg.

The number of iron lungs in the state, the number of hot pack machines, nurses and other necessary equipment and people are being catalogued for reference. When an epidemic strikes, Hall told the board, it is important to know at once where all available equipment and assistance is available.

Operations of the National Foundation were explained to the board by the two, who attended as guests of Mrs. Lewis Ulrich, representative of the Health association on Jackson county's polio committee.

There is a two million dollar revolving fund created for the purpose of sending money to localities, where an epidemic arises and local monies are all used. That fund was almost exhausted last year Hall stated. To Rockford, Ill., where an epidemic hit, the foundation sent a total of \$100,000 for the one county he explained. Oregon had a low year last year with just 69 cases, of these 37 were cared for at Dornbecker hospital.

Following Hall's talk the board agreed to confer with Dr. A. E. Merkel, public health officer, when he receives Hall's report and make any purchase of special equipment recommended for this county.

Reviewing the recent drive for funds Mrs. Ulrich said there were many generous contributions from new sources in the women's division and particularly interesting was a donation of \$19.55 from school children of Gold Hill.

Reports were made by Mrs. John S. Day on reorganization of the junior group as the Medford health unit, Mrs. Alex Sparrow, treasurer, and the president, Mrs. Hedberg.

The board voted to move the annual meeting of the Jackson County Public Health association up to Saturday, April 27, this year.

LUMBER CHANGE SEEN HARDSHIP FOR OPERATORS

The new price ceiling for Douglas fir lumber is not being received too happily by the lumber industry in this area, according to A. A. Lausmann, one of the spokesmen for the mill operators. "It is not an increase in price but a material decrease for many mills," Lausmann said Saturday. "To cover cost of production many mills have been cutting special lumber, the premium price for which, I understand, has been eliminated by the new order. The sale of premium lumber has enabled mills to get increased returns without violating ceilings or resorting to the black market."

"This price revision, however, will not doubt be known as the 'prohibition amendment,' and may develop a lot of lumber moonshiners. That's bad for the community and country."

Leader Quoted
Lausmann quoted H. V. Simpson, executive vice-president of the West Coast Lumbermen's association as saying in Seattle that publicity from the OPA in Washington, D. C., saying that the readjustment of lumber price ceilings will give mills a profit three per cent greater than at present, is a foolish statement, which is in effect contradicted by Peter Stone, OPA lumber price executive, himself. "It is a situation in which the real OPA authority on lumber prices has said one thing, while OPA publicity policy for some reason or another dictates the saying of another thing," Simpson stated, according to Lausmann.
